Jury trials return to county courts

Jury trials are on the docket again in Orange County. They restarted at the first of the year locally after a nine-month halt because of the coronavirus pandemic. Still, judges are taking plenty of precautions. The county's jury selection, which began its every

"We've been going about it pretty much like business as usual."

Over a video call. "Most of our hearings have been conducted by Zoom, criminal cases and civil cases as well. You turn on the computers and get on Zoom

and conduct the case. "We've been having several Zoom hearings a day," Parkhurst said.

"But the absence of jury trials has slowed things down."

The judge said it's been a good thing there hasn't been

a lot of jail inmates who have requested trials.

"Now we're trying to get to those cases first, the people in jail that want jury cases," he said. "And what we're trying to do, especially at the start, is do the cases that aren't so complicated.

"We don't want people [jurors] sitting up there for hours a day. So far, it's worked out extremely well, I thought. Nobody complained."

Of the 100-plus who showed up for Monday's 9

Michelle Huff has been involved with coaching cheerleaders at Bridge City High School for 25 years. Her girls have gone to many competitions through the years and a plethora of girls have participated in Cheer Hawaii each year. There was one area of competition that many other school sports participate in, but cheer was ignored.

University Interscholastic League (UIL) held its first

cheerleading competition just six short years ago. Huff and her assistant Valrie Gilbeaux went by themselves the first year, just to check it out. Bridge City has not only competed in, but has made it all the way to the state competition each of the last five years.

The UIL Spirit State Championship is comprised of the top 20 squads in the state per classification. Huff said most years, class 4-A has had over 90 schools competing. This year, because of COVID-19, not all

schools were allowed to compete, so the field was narrowed to 64.

The Bridge City team wasn't without its own challenges. They are only allowed to bring 20 girls from all of the squads combined.

"The week we had to go, one of the girls had to get quarantined. We had to replace her at the last minute," said Huff.

"Wow, it was just so emotional...as a coach you want them to do good, but once they get out there on the mat, you've done all you can

do. The heart they put into their performance that day. They made me so proud."

The team competed in three categories: Fight Song, Band, and Crowd Leading. In the preliminary round the Cardinals placed 3rd in Fight Song; 3rd in Band; and 14th in Crowd Leading.

When the final round is announced, which consists of the top 12, all previous scores are thrown out and everyone starts from scratch in scores. When the dust

Pastors seek to lead area city councils

Randy Branch, pastor of the Wesley United Methodist Church of Orange, wants to become West Orange's first new mayor since 1995.

Johnny Asevedo, pastor of non-denominational Destiny Church, is running for Pinehurst City Council with plans to sell the town as a go-to location.

Branch, a member of the West Orange city council the past three years, will face Jim Whittington, a former Louisiana Justice of the Peace, in the Saturday, May 1 election.

There could be others in

the race, too.

The deadline for registering to run in the local elections for city council and most area school districts is Friday, Feb. 12.

Roy McDonald, West Orange mayor since 1995, recently announced he will not run for reelection.

"I was kind of hoping Roy would take another turn," Branch said, "but he's got to do what's best for him and Laverne, so ..."

Branch said he's "kind of excited and kind of anxious," about taking the top spot.

"The people who really run

Districts seek priority for teachers' vaccines

Orangefield Independent School District may or may not be the first in the county to do it but it sure won't be the last.

School board members voted 6-0 Monday night to approve a resolution requesting the state designate all public school district personnel as "essential frontline workers" and be given appropriate priority for receiving the COVID-19 vaccine as it becomes available.

"We mailed it today to Austin," Shaun McAlpin, Orangefield's schools superintendent, said Tuesday afternoon.

"A lot of districts are doing

it. I think Bridge City already has sent a resolution and that Vidor and West Orange are planning to."

Currently, school nurses are the only educational personnel identified by the state of Texas for vaccination under Phase 1A or Phase 1B of the Texas COVID-19 Vaccination Plan.

The state hasn't released a list of who might qualify for Phase 1C, but in explaining why it put people 65 and over and those with higher risks in ahead of teachers, the Expert Vaccine Allocation Panel said this:

"Because Phase 1B provides vaccine to higher-risk people regardless of their


Here are five things happening around your state:

1. Senate Redistricting Committee to begin hearings

The Senate Committee on Redistricting will begin the important work of meeting to hear testimony from around the state regarding the redrawing of State House, Senate, State Board of Education, and US Congressional maps. Testimony will be open to the public, but will be virtual to adhere to COVID-19 safety guidelines and ensure Texans all over the state have an opportunity to participate. Redistricting happens once every ten years. It follows the completion of the US Census. Though the Census was delayed this year due to the ongoing pandemic, we are looking forward to working on redrawing maps when we get the data. It's my honor to serve on the Senate Redistricting Committee and I look forward to being a strong voice for East Texas during this process.

2. NRA to move to Texas

The National Rifle Association announced it is filing for bankruptcy in New York last week and said they plan to reincorporate in Texas. The Association had been incorporated in New York for approximately 150 years. The decision to leave comes due to what they call a "corrupt political and regulatory environment" in New York. Meanwhile, Texas is home to over 400,000 NRA members and will host the NRA's Annual Meeting in Houston this year. The association will continue their work of promoting firearm safety and training, challenging anti-Second Amendment activity, and advancing public programs across the US. As a member of the NRA and a proud defender of Second Amend-

3. Palestine Economic Development Corporation and Etex Communications partner to expand fiber broadband access

The Palestine Economic Development Corporation (PEDC) has partnered with Etex Communications to bring fiber broadband to Palestine and Anderson County. PEDC identified broadband as a key economic development issue and has worked over the last several months to study current internet access and plans to improve it. Part of the plan is to pull fiber, on Etex's network, from Jacksonville to Palestine. To do that, PEDC committed \$1.1 million to fund a portion of the cost of construction. They are focused on bringing broadband to local businesses which is vital for creating jobs, supporting economic growth, and generating revenue to do additional broadband expansion into residential communities. The goal is for PEDC and Etex to reinvest revenue to expand the network as more customers come on board. 4. Don't Mess with Texas Scholarship Contest Opens

The Texas Department of Transportation in partnership with Keep Texas Beautiful announced the opening of the Don't Mess with Texas Scholarship contest on January 4. This contest recognizes Texas high school seniors who are taking a leadership role in litter prevention in their school or community. 5. US Dept. of Labor issues guidance for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance continuation program


The US Department of Labor issued guidelines to assist the Texas Workforce Commission in continuing to implement Pandemic Unemployment Assistance and Pandemic Unemployment Compensation. Congress passed the Continued Assistance for Unemployed Workers Act of 2020 at the end of last year. The bill authorized up to 11 additional benefits weeks to Texans on unemployment due to the pandemic. The bill also extends CARES Act benefits through March 13 and includes an extra \$300 per week for eligible claimants. TWC announced they will automatically enroll all Texans who are eligible for benefits under the act. There is no need for anyone to call or reapply. Importantly, this does not impact work search requirements. Most Texans will still be required to conduct work searches. a.m. jury call, nearly two dozen were dismissed in the first 30 minutes, leaving two jury pools of 40 prospective jury members for two separate trials to be held by Parkhurst and 128th District Judge Courtney Arkeen. Questioning by defense and prosecution lawyers in a process called voir dire picked the two 12-person, one-alternate juries by noon. Tuesday, the juries joined the lawyers and court staff back in the Orange County Courthouse, in the judge's normal courtrooms. Only three jury members sat in the jury boxes, the rest

were spaced apart on the front rows of the courtroom spectator seating. The county provided face shields for everyone. The case in the 128th was over by lunchtime, the testimony short and the jury quickly reaching a verdict. Parkhurst said his criminal mischief case included only three witnesses, but the jury needed a lunch break before reaching a not guilty verdict and clearing the courtroom about 2:30 p.m. This was Parkhurst's first trial since the courts went virtual in the spring. The defendant in his trial set for

Jan. 11 pleaded guilty at the last minute. He said while the courts normally alternate between civil and criminal cases that criminal cases are at the forefront as they restart jury trials. "If there are people in jail, we need to get their cases done," the judge said. "Plus, criminal trials are faster, usually, than civil trials. "Some civil trials take three weeks. I'm just not ready to make people sit through that. I don't think it's fair to the jurors."

West Orange are (city secretary) Therese Van Meter, (city manager) Mike Stelly and (public works director) John Sherwin. They're the ones that make things work," Branch said. "I just feel like this [running for mayor] is the right thing to do. I know Roy will be around a while. I'll be looking to him for his experience and help." In Pinehurst, five seats are up for grabs this year, including mayor. T.W. Permenter, the seated mayor, is running for reelection, along with alderman Greg Willis and Asevedo is the only other to have filed so far. "My mission is to help restore and bring growth to our town," Asevedo said. "I love the city and I want to see Pinehurst reach its full potential." Asevedo is 34, married and a father of three. He and his wife Karen launched Destiny Church. He said he sold two insurance concerns, each with a \$1 million book of business, when he became a pastor.

"With my sales and business background, I can really sell Pinehurst as a place people want to come to, not just some place on the way to Orange," he said. Asevedo said that in the aftermath of Hurricane Laura last summer, the City of Pinehurst was sending citizens to Orange for help. Meanwhile, his church off Strickland Drive was feeding 2,000 meals per day for more than a week because the church had planned the operation before the storm. "We were the only non-government-funded distribution site in Orange County," he said. "Talking about a plan is one thing, but following through is a different conversation." Counties push for more vaccines

Orange County has joined a five-county Southeast Texas group in an effort to get more COVID-19 vaccines into the arms of its citizens. John Gothia, Orange County judge, said the goal is to establish one or more permanent vaccination hub sites and possibly a mobile vaccine unit for use in Orange, Hardin, Jasper, Newton, and Jefferson Counties. By combining their public health resources and populations, the resulting "consortium" covering a population of nearly a half-million residents would be able to guarantee the state that it has the ability to give out 22,000 vaccinations per week, which Gothia explained is a requirement to be considered a permanent hub. In the meantime, residents 65 years of age or over, or those aged 16-64 with a

chronic medical condition are urged to pre-register for vaccination online at vaccine.beaumonttx.gov, or by phone at 409-550-2536. "Registration will be done," Jeff Branick, Jefferson County Judge, said at a press conference in Beaumont Monday morning to announce the new coordinated vaccination push. "But scheduling will not be done until we know we have significant vaccine for those in category 1A and 1B." People under 65 who lack one of the following underlying conditions (cancer, chronic kidney disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease or cardiomyopathies, solid or

gan transplantation, obesity and severe obesity, pregnancy, sickle cell disease, type 2 diabetes) are asked not to pre-register at this time. Gothia said the first permanent hub would be at Ford Park in Beaumont. "But if we get the full 22,000 doses we're asking for, we could have a hub in Orange County," Gothia said. A mobile unit would be in one county for a day or two at a time as were the mobile testing sites in the spring and summer. Members of the consortium named at the press conference were the public health authorities of Jasper, Newton, Hardin, Orange and Jefferson Counties, along with the cities of Port Arthur and Beaumont and the Riceland Healthcare Centers, which has operations in Beaumont, Winnie, Vidor and Woodville.

work sector or status, it will provide protection for a number of critical populations [that are] at an increased risk of getting COVID-19" and then lists teachers and school staff, social service workers, critical infrastructure workers "and other frontline workers who are unable to work remotely and so are more likely to be exposed." Though already at the top of the list of critical popula-

tions above, teachers and school personnel definitely fit into that last group, too. According to reports posted on the Texas Department of State Health Services website, 42 students and 35 adult employees of the Orangefield district have tested positive for COVID-19 since September. The total of educators and staff members from county schools who have tested positive this school year is about

175. "Basically, it was a resolution to include educators and other school district employees in the tiered approach to vaccination," Orangefield's McAlpin said of his board's resolution. "The whole point was to encourage them to consider us at least as an option to sign up. Just consider us so that school employees get signed up."

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I'M WORKING BETWEEN DISTRACTIONS A BRIEF SUMMARY

It's never a good time to be admitted to the hospital, but now is really a bad time. Beds are not available at will and the ER walls are lined up with people lying on stretchers. After about 16 hours I got lucky and in the middle of the night I made it to a room. A young man RN was from Ohio. All hospital personnel work five days a week, 12-hour shifts and are very understaffed. Most admit that they are all very tired. They are professionals; they smile and try to accommodate the best they can. Arrangements had been made at Medical Center to transfer me to a Galveston hospital. Again, luck was with me, after a day of blood transfusions, Dr. Alampur, MD, agreed to do my procedure, Dr. Abochamh, MD, from the Golden Triangle Cardio Group, agreed to be my attending provider. I had been losing a lot of blood from somewhere in my belly and that had my blood pressure down to a very dangerous low. Finding a couple of other issues, it was determined that the blood was coming from a bleeding ulcer. The bleeding stopped but my blood pressure is hanging at a low ebb. This keeps me light headed and dizzy, worse yet because of three different problems. I am strictly on a bland diet, but if not for the ulcer I could be eating better. Have you ever tried to drink "celery juice." I don't know how many stalks they have to squeeze to make a cup that they call celery broth. I missed everything about the inauguration; the entire week was wiped out. From the tone of the positive news on the TV, it seems like old times before our government was at a four year Trump reality clown show. I did get home in time to catch the youngster Patrick Mahomes and the Chiefs win and move on to the Super Bowl. I watched the professor, Tom Brady, 43, beat Aaron Rodgers and the Packers to advance to the Super Bowl. What a game that should be, young legs against old experience. A legend in every sense of the word, he was one of the greatest baseball players of all time. A champion for civil rights, he was a roll model for every youngster. He was given a hard time by White Supremist for breaking Babe Ruth's record. Hank ended his career with 755 homeruns, a record later broken by Barry Bonds. "Hammerin Hank, R.I.P. #44." Brenda Gale Bergeron Brimer, 72, Orange



The early morning call from Jay was a little unexpected as I had not heard from him in over a year. "News travels slowly up here, but Lisa just told us about your Mom. Our neighbor recently died from Covid-19 so I guess there isn't any place to hide from it." His condolences were appreciated as was his invitation. "I caught my first double digit fish of the year last Thursday and I think you ought to take a little break and come fish with me next week."

I do not consider it to be a stretch to say that catching double digit bass on Toledo Bend has been a regular occurrence for Jay Hughes over the past seven years. "Regular" is a relative term, but his daily records tell the story. I would not expect anyone to believe the number of big bass he has caught and released over that span of time, but it merits listening when he says, "Now is the time to get it done!" He also casually mentioned the fact that fourteen of those fish were caught between the middle of January and the end of February.

Fourteen is a staggering number in itself, but Jay is quick to point out that several of those fish may not have quite made the ten pound mark as he seldom weighs them and there is also the possibility that he may have caught one or two of them more than once. "The current conditions could not be better," he added. "Longer days, the lake level is perfect and this little warm spell is just what the doctor ordered. Maybe I'll catch my first twelve pounder this year."

A single ten pound fish in a life time would satisfy most fishermen. Hughes actually started targeting big bass only nine years ago. "Once I pinpointed when my chances were the best, I began bass fishing only those months and crappie fishing the rest of the year." Jay openly laments the fact that his eldest grandchild, Lisa, is headed to LSU next fall and she is the only other person that knows most of what he knows about big bass. "She accidentally caught an eight pounder on a shiner while crappie fishing when she was twelve and she has been hooked ever since. I would have to look, but I think she has caught three bass over ten pounds."

Lisa now fishes with her "Big Poppa" only during his two prime times of the year for duping over-sized bass. And what is that second prime time? "Depending on lake level and water temperature, I prefer night fishing in the summer over the early spring bite, revealed Hughes. "Big bass are creatures of habit and they spend much of the summer in 20 to 23 feet of water. Their hold-ups are very isolated and that means more time spent fishing than boat riding." "We have actually

Happy Deshaun Watson is like Super Bowl LV win in Houston

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers may be happy to get into Super Bowl LV Feb. 7, but they may not be overjoyed to be the first out of the last 108 Super Bowl teams to be playing in Raymond James Stadium—their home field—because they reached the ultimate encounter by winning all three NFL playoff games on the road.

But the team appreciates the move the front office made last winter to obtain 43-year-old Tom Brady as their quarterback for the 2020 season.

After all, this will be Brady's 10th Super Bowl he will have played in, with six of them resulting in World Championships—all with the New England Patriots—whose head coach Bill Belichick felt he was too old to play well enough to even reach the 2020 playoffs.

Belichick was half right because his team did NOT reach the playoffs for the first time in a decade, but this time without Brady, who kept his decade-long streak intact by leading his new team not only to the 2020 playoffs, but also to the Super Bowl.

Brady led his four-point underdog

Memorial service held for Hammerin' Hank

ATLANTA -- Brian Snitker choked back tears as he remembered Hank Aaron's affection for those who didn't possess his unparalleled talent on the baseball field.

During his post-playing career running the Atlanta Braves farm system, the Hammer had a penchant for looking beyond the can't-miss prospects.

"He always wanted to move a player up, and he preferred that it wasn't the so-called bo-

nus babies," said Snitker, who has managed the Braves since 2016 and got his start in the dugout thanks to Aaron. "He wanted to get that grinder guy, the guy who was overachieving."

Snitker was among those who spoke Tuesday at a memorial service honoring Aaron, who died last week from natural causes at the age of 86.

Baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred, Hall of Famer Chipper Jones and former Braves

outfielder Marquis Grissom were among those who spoke at the ceremony, which was held before a small, socially distanced crowd - including Aaron's widow, Billye, and other family members - on the concourse directly behind home plate at Truist Park.

The remarks were delivered in an exhibit known as Monument Garden, which prominently features a statue of Aaron delivering the swing that produced 755 homers.

Aaron's famed No. 44 was painted in the dormant grass of center field. Braves Chairman Terry McGuirk noted the unseasonably warm January weather - the temperature climbed into the upper 60s - as a sign from above honoring one of the game's greatest icons.

Noting the 10 Baseball of Famers who have died in the past year, Manfred said the Aaron "belongs on our sport's Mount Rushmore."

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
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Final weekend woes for duck hunters, look to snow geese

Local waterfowl hunters finish off their main season this weekend and for many it will be welcome sight. Ducks and geese locally been beyond sparse and just down right non existent in many areas. A few hunters are still grinding away at some smaller concentrations of birds and having a few good hunts but those are few and far between. The biggest majority of the birds still hanging around locally are mostly green winged and blue winged teal without h a few gadwall thrown in for good measure. Overall the num-



bers are slim but you can't shoot them while sitting on your coach so get all you can because it'll be months before we get to chase them again.

Normally when regular duck season ends there is a big push of attention thrown towards the snow goose conservation season. Areas in Arkansas, Missouri, Kansas, and even farther north become magnets for hunters wanting to cash in on some non stop action. In most of those states mentioned they don't hunt the snow geese during the regular season, instead they let those numbers of birds build to huge concentrations and then once the regulations are eased they move in for some impressive shoots. If you have never done a snow goose conservation hunt you owe it to yourself to do it, you won't be sorry.

Once the snow goose conservation season begins many hunters will opt outfit their shotguns with extended magazines in order to take advantage of the new rules. Shotguns must not hold more than 3 shells, 1 in the chamber and 2 in the magazine, during the regular waterfowl season. Once the conservation season kicks off you can carry as many shells as you want, popular models will hold as many as 10 shells. Of course the magazine extensions are legal at the moment and have been for quite some time but who knows what will happen in the future with this administration and their dislike for gun owners. At this point in time all of those, myself included, who have been described as "Bubba Trump" are being targeted for a whole host of new laws and restrictions surrounding

weapons and magazines where huge fines could be levied against those in possession of certain guns and ammo. The future of the shooting sports is definitely facing some irrational challenges from the left and that will play itself out in the coming future.

For the time being local hunters will hit the marshes for the last weekend of the regular season before either heading north to take advantage of the conservation season or just shutting it down until next September when we start again. I'm quite sure a few of those hunters who have been after it all season will welcome February and the opportunity to start fishing again, at least for a while until they start thinking about next season and what to do when it gets here.

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Gulf of Mexico marine sanctuary nearly triples in size

This week, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration announced it will expand the Flower Garden Banks National Marine Sanctuary to nearly triple its current size. Situated on salt domes rising up from the seafloor, Flower Garden Banks is one of only two marine sanctuaries in the entire Gulf of Mexico. Its brightly colored coral reefs are an important feeding ground for seabirds like Northern Gannets and Magnificent Frigatebirds.

After many years of gathering input from the fishing, diving, and conservation communities as well as the oil and gas industry, NOAA

will expand the Flower Garden Banks National Marine Sanctuary from 56 to 160 square-miles off the coasts of Texas and Louisiana. The Gulf of Mexico is still recovering from the BP Deepwater Horizon oil disaster 10 years ago, which began in the deep sea. From the smallest plankton, to the biggest whale sharks, the BP oil disaster affected the entire northern Gulf ecosystem. As the \$20 billion BP settlement is spent to restore the Gulf, marine protected areas like this one allows the Gulf's marine life a safe space to rest and feed, free from human disturbance.

Once the expansion takes effect, fishing gear will be limited, which decreases seabird bycatch and minimizes

the amount of fish taken out of the ecosystem, providing seabirds with more fish to eat. Additionally, limiting oil and natural gas extraction will reduce the threat of additional oil spills in the Gulf. Without disturbance, popu-

lations of marine animals are healthier and more robust. Creating spaces in the ocean with little to no threats for the entire ecosystem to thrive has implications beyond the area of protection. As fish populations grow in

number, they spillover to other areas of the ocean, creating more fish for fishermen to harvest and seabirds and other marine wildlife to eat.

With the increasing amount of human disturbances to our oceans and coasts, marine protected areas are more important now than ever for seabirds and other wildlife. Global seabird populations and North American shorebird populations have both declined by 70 percent in under 70 years. Human-caused threats such as development, harmful fishing practices, oil spills, and more have contributed to this decline. To reduce threats, marine protected areas provide spaces in the ocean and along our coasts for sea- and shorebirds to

thrive.

When there are adequate protections in an area, the related coastal economies also get a boost. For example, marine protected areas provide ecosystem resources that are far higher than what they cost to operate and monitor these areas. For every \$1 spent on establishing and monitoring marine protected areas, \$20 is returned. That's because these protected areas in the ocean benefit fisheries, improve tourism, sequester carbon, and host coastal ecosystems that provide neighboring communities storm protection benefits. Flower Garden Banks in particular supports a vibrant scuba diving industry on the Texas coast.

at home in Super Bowl LV.

distressed because he was told by owner Cal McNair he would have some input on the hiring of a new general manager and new head coach.

Watson's feelings were bruised deeply when he found out Nick Caserio was hired away from the New England Patriots couple of weeks ago without being asked anything about the move. The fourth-year quarterback said he did not want to play another down for the Texans, but did not demand a trade at the time.

He did say he'd prefer the team to hire Kansas City's offensive coordinator Eric Bieniemy or Robert Saleh, but Saleh was named the new head coach of the New York Jets last week. Bieniemy could not be able to be hired until after the Feb. 7 Super Bowl.

ESPN announced on its First Take show Monday morning that Watson said he would like to play for Saleh's

New York Jets as his first choice and the Miami Dolphins next. But at this writing, he has not said publicly that he wanted to be traded.

Caserio may be treading on dangerous waters by wanting to hire a new head coach first and then try to pacify Watson later. I don't think it's going to work that way. Caserio and McNair need to meet with Watson immediately and give him some input on the head coaching situation.

Caserio and McNair could very well already have a new head coach hired by the time this Korner hits the streets Wednesday. Then they definitely would have to find a new quarterback.

I think it would be neat if the Texans hired Aaron Rodgers and Green Bay replaced him with Watson.

But I believe that leaving a 12-3 team for a 4-12 team would be giving Rodgers the short end of the stick.

caught more nine to ten-pound bass in the summer than the early spring, (five just last summer), but we have longer to get it done and the weather is much more forgiving. Lisa sunburns easily so this is perfect for her.

He was also quick to point out that you can learn a lot about your granddaughter while sitting in a bass boat in the dark all night long. If you are yet to catch your first ten pounder, you may want to make a note of a few of the findings Jay was willing to share. In the early spring its longer days and warmer water. Off colored water can actually help as the fish hold a little tighter to cover. If the lake level doesn't drop or rise significantly, spend your day in eight to twelve feet of water. Grass isn't nearly as important as depth change. "A little ditch or small hump often attracts more than one big bass," says Hughes. He also says you can leave all those tackle boxes at the camp.

Every big pre-spawn bass I have caught hit either a jig and craw worm or a half ounce single spin spinner bait. A number six or seven Colorado blade and a pork or plastic trailer renders the spinner bait even more effective. S-L-O-W is always better for big bass! "In the summer, its isolated depth changes as there is very little grass at the depths we fish," states Hughes. "Pay attention to the major feeding periods and fish big baits. We fish a ten inch power worm with a rattle almost exclusively and Lisa is convinced a little dab of crawfish scent is a difference maker." "Yes," I accepted his invitation!



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Big Thicket Heritage Trust helping grow and protect nature

The Big Thicket Natural Heritage Trust continues to help grow and protect the Big Thicket National Preserve and conservation lands across Southeast Texas. In these difficult times, the natural world continues to bring solace.

With the help of generous donors and utilizing a Federal Highway Administration National Recreational Trails Fund grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the Trust closed on a 39 acre property in Tyler County just east of Woodville that contains the Dogwood Trail. The trail is located in a beautiful wooded tract that has not been logged in over 100 years. The former timber company property will be donated to the Texas Forest Service. They will rehabilitate the trail, manage the forest resources and provide educational programs. The Trust appreciates the additional financial support acquired from The Edaren Foundation, The Damuth Foundation, The Pineywoods Foundation, Ms. Maxine Johnston, Texas A&M Forest Service, The Conservation Fund, the Texas Conservation Alliance, and individual donors.

The Trust initiated purchase on a small parcel directly in front of the Kirby Nature Trail entrance. Developers purchased the 500-acre property adjacent to FM 420 and the Turkey Creek Unit and are selling parcels. The purchase will at least protect a portion of the view shed. This completes a land acquisition project with funds acquired from a TLL Temple grant.

In partnership with the National Environmental Education Foundation, the Trust completed the removal

of hurricane debris- appliances, boats and household trash- from 6.75 miles of Pine Island Bayou

On Martin Luther King Day 2020, the Trust co-sponsored the 10th Anniversary of the National Parks Conservation Association's long-leaf tree planting. On this National Day of Service for the Preserve, the non-profit fed pizza to 150 volunteers who planted 12,000 seedlings.

Under the leadership of President Ellen Buchanan, the Trust continues to par-

ticipate in advocacy. The organization works with counties to review land conservation and natural infrastructure to ensure communities receive the best tools to address flooding following natural disasters. Counties are urged to consider donating buyout properties to the National Park Service where feasible and appropriate.
