

# Two decades later child's murder is not solved

Twenty years ago, a few people were getting music from the internet thanks to a new device called the iPod. Netflix mailed DVDs. Less than half of Americans had broadband internet service. No one had dreamed of a smartphone that people would allow people to

have a computer in their pocket, or conceived of social media.

Technology has changed the world in two decades. But technology still has not caught up with Orange County's biggest mystery. Who killed little Dannarriah Finley on the Fourth of July, w 2002?

Orange Police Detec-

tive Captain Jason Ashworth repeats what others before him have said. "Someday, technology will help us. There's new methods, new procedures, new techniques," he said.

He points out how DNA samples led authorities in 2018 to the Golden State Killer, a serial murderer and rapist whose crimes

spanned 1974-1986. Those crimes were never forgotten and reopened periodically through the years.

And no one in Orange is going to forget 4-year-old Dannarriah Finley, especially in the police department. The little purple shorts and flowered shirt she was wearing when she was taken from

her home and killed are framed on the wall in detectives offices. Other charts and evidence are also displayed as a constant reminder of the unsolved crime.

Ashworth wasn't even with the Orange Police Department twenty years ago. "I'm the first to be sit-

## County sticks Feds with high meal tab

Things would really suck the breath out of you if Orange County suffers another storm like Hurricane Harvey.

But first responders and others working out of the Emergency Operations Center at the Orange County Convention and Expo Center aren't likely to complain about the eats.

County Commissioners voted unanimously Tuesday to pay \$30 per meal for four meals a day -- or \$120 per day per person -- for Disaster Food Services served at the EOC.

L3S BBQ & Catering, a business headed by chef Mike Lemoine, former owner of the Boardwalk Cafe in downtown Orange, was the only business to submit a proposal after Requests For Proposals went out, County Purchasing Agent Tim Funch-

ess said.

"I think that's pretty high, \$30 per meal," Commissioner Theresa Beauchamp declared.

"Just so everybody knows," Commissioner Kirk Roccaforte explained to the non-county employees in the audience, "we're talking about these guys pretty much stay there. They supply the utensils, they supply the food, they supply the drinks. They are 24-7 pretty much during a disaster.

"Now I'm not trying to make it sound better. But I want everyone to know, that's not going to be cheap from anybody."

Judge John Gothia brought a sweetener to the discussion.

"Generally, that's refundable," Gothia said, indicating that FEMA would reimburse the county's meal expenses during a

## Orange continues cleaning with removal of rotting houses

The city of Orange continues its effort to clean up as more sub-standard buildings were torn down. The clean-up goes along with the progress on adding new residences.

Last month the city issued eight building permits for new houses along with seven permits issued for demolitions. The buildings were in different areas with the addresses as 1205 Main Avenue, 1207 DuPont Drive, 2311 Riverside Drive, 2322 Butler, 1110 13th Street, 3915 Meeks Drive, and 1910 Luther Drive.

DSLH Homes Southwest received permits for eight new houses in the Cypresswood Village subdivision between Highway 87 South and FM 105. The city does not list values on residential permits. However, the DSLD website advertises the houses between \$230,000 and \$280,000.

D.R. Horton Homes had a permit for one new house on Allie Payne Road at Mallard Lakes development. The company's website lists a new home on Allie Payne, west of Little Cypress Intermediate School, for about

\$350,000.

Also in the residential category, the city issued two permits for house add-on projects, ten for home remodeling, and two for swimming pools. In addition, a permit for a \$45,000 residential concrete pad was given for 8809 Martin Luther King Jr. Drive. Three permits for residential fences plus two for home garages were granted.

People continue to prepare for hurricane season and power outages by installing generators. Nine permits were issued to connect home generators to electricity and 15 permits were for gas connections to generators. Rogers Lumber Company on Old Highway 90 had a commercial permit for a generator.

For more than a year, city building permits have included home solar electricity installations. In May, three more were issued.

The commercial permits have Tregre Enterprises, 1813 DuPont Drive in the Cove neighborhood getting a \$43,000 worth of concrete work for a new parking lot. Orange Stationer at 701 Division Avenue in downtown continued to get permits related to its remodeling project.

ting in this chair (head of detectives) who wasn't here at the time," he said. The other detective captains before him are now retired.

However, he can't complain about how the investigation was conducted. Orange police at the time called in Texas Rangers and FBI agents. Dozens worked gathering evidence and interviewing people.

"I've never seen a case before or after that was investigated so thoroughly," Ashworth said. "We have binders and binders full of evidence."

He's read up on the case, as have others who were

not at the department during the summer of 2002. They also keep up with the latest forensic developments. "It's incumbent on us to keep aware of new technology that comes on line," he said. If new technique is developed, they will have their evidence tested again.

Her mother, Jaimie Arnold, reported Dannarriah missing to police the afternoon of Thursday, July 4, 2002. She told officers she had seen the child at 4 a.m. and saw the girl was missing when she awoke about 10 a.m. Before calling police, she looked through the neighborhood and called relatives.

The family lived in a small wood frame house in the 1000 block of Fourth Street, across from historic shotgun houses off Park Avenue and Fourth. The house was demolished after being damaged by Hurricane Rita. Police think the girl was taken from the house, possibly by someone she knew.

The day after she was reported missing, her photograph was taken by every business in Orange and the surrounding area. The photos were displayed everywhere and the little girl was the talk of the town.

On the Saturday after

her disappearance, hundreds of volunteers, including the Equusearch horse team, worked in 100 degree heat to look for Dannarriah. They checked every brush pile and storage shed, and crawled under houses in an area from Green Avenue north to the interstate, and west of Simmons Drive and east of 16th Street. The child was never found.

Mount Zion Baptist Church under the Reverend C.W. Crawford on John Avenue, down the street from the house, became a central gathering place for volunteers searching and those providing food and water.

The church had a special service for the child.

The bad news came on the Monday of July 8. A worker on Pleasure Island in Port Arthur, 27 miles away, found the decomposing body of a child on the hot sand. An alligator had been swimming nearby. Tests were rushed and the victim matched Dannarriah. Port Arthur police also joined the investigation.

The child had been wrapped in a colorful flowered sheet that had been made years before by Springfield. Photographs of the sheet were at businesses next to Dannarriah's picture and police

asked for help in linking the sheet to someone. No one came forward.

Mount Zion Church held her funeral with more than 750 people throughout the community mourning the loss of the child who died days before her fifth birthday.

That loss is still mourned, especially by police. And as a new generation of law officers takes on the case, they promise they will not forget little Dannarriah Finley.

disaster.

Morgan Taylor, the county's point person for FEMA rules and paperwork, told the judge accepting LS3 BBQ's proposal was proper.

"We're showing that we went out for procurement and followed the (FEMA guidelines). We did reach out to multiple people in Orange County to let them know about the opportunity."

"As long as we follow the FEMA guidelines," Gothia agreed.

"Everything's going up," Taylor said of the price.

Gothia said that during a disaster he provided a daily headcount for the caterer to use to prepare meals.

"The number of meals we serve (each day) depends on the size of the disaster," Taylor said. "It could be just (county EOC workers) or 1,500 people, like Harvey."

Asked after Tuesday's Commissioners Court about the fourth meal of the day, Gothia said that besides breakfast, lunch and dinner, a midnight meal was prepared mostly for law enforcement personnel.

"I don't see we have a choice," Commissioner Robert Viator said.

"I don't like it but we'd be in trouble if we didn't have any food for the first responders," Roccaforte said.

"We'd get no help," Viator agreed.

Money the county won't get back was the \$1.5 million paid in weekly bills for June 28.

Good news is that much of that money -- \$482,000 -- was reimbursement to contractors from grant

funds and another \$50,000 came from storm insurance settlements or drug forfeiture funds, not from the general fund.

A year-plus without a disaster and a \$10 million FEMA reimbursement check received for Hurricane Laura expenses left the county in position to add a new position as Fleet Risk Management Coordinator.

The position will pay \$47,424 per year (\$22.80 per hour) and allow the county to centralize information about the vehicles and heavy equipment under the control of various departments.

"Hopefully, centralizing it into a system will help with reimbursement and Morgan's grant stuff," said Lori Ardoin, Human Resources Director.

Ardoin said currently she and County Risk Management Director Missy Pillsbury have joint responsibility after an auto wreck or other accident.

"They report to HR if there's an injury and to Missy with the cars," she said.

Said Gothia: "We've been trying to do this for two years, but disasters keep getting in the way."

Ad valorem tax payments in May put \$558,732 in county coffers.

Commissioners agreed to pump \$100,000 from the county's contingency fund into the Sheriff's Office fuel, oil, gas and grease account.

Chief Deputy Mark Dubois said the SO was originally budgeted \$200,000 for fuel, oil, gas and grease for the entire fiscal year, which runs through Sept.

### TRUMP DIDN'T WANT TO DO ANYTHING ABOUT VIOLENCE AT CAPITOL

The House Committee investigating the Capitol attack Jan. 6, 2021, held an abruptly scheduled hearing Tuesday with testimony from former White House aide Cassidy Hutchinson and 'recently obtained evidence.' Hutchinson witnessed White House strategy sessions to challenge the 2020 election results as a top aide to former Chief of Staff Mark Meadows. Meadows told White House lawyer Pat Cipollone on Jan. 6, 2021, that President Donald Trump didn't want to do anything to stop the violence that was taking place at the Capitol. This is according to Cassidy Hutchinson's testimony.

### FINGER POINTING CONTINUES IN UVALDE

In the wake of the senseless tragedy, the people of Uvalde and Texas have demanded answers from their government. To date, they have been met with lies, misstatements, and shifts of blame. While the governor vows that results of Texas Rangers and FBI investigations will be released when completed, the chaos and infighting among law enforcement agencies continues. The governor, who promised the public clarity and accuracy after he was forced to retrace his early heroic depiction of Uvalde police response, has resisted records requests as well, unless they seemed to benefit him. Abbott, up for re-election in November against Democratic Beto O'Rourke, agreed to release to Houston's KTRK-TV his handwritten notes from the day of the shooting that seem to support his claim that he was misled about the facts. The public's right to know and the media's watchdog role is holding officials accountable have never been more important. This back and forth, a disappointing tangle of self-interest, has obscured the truth and eroded trust. Senate Committee Chairman Senator Robert Nichols of Jacksonville, who represents Orange County said, "We don't really know what all to believe because we're learn so much stuff." Nichols asked for clarifications about the classroom door lock. All this maneuvering to protect agencies, officials and colleagues stands in stark contrast to the protection that those 19 children and their teachers didn't get. Grieving families and Uvalde residents deserve more. They deserve the truth. It's the least officials can do after failing the shooting victims so tragically. In some of the most jolting revelations yet, Department of public Safety Director Steve McCraw testified last week to the Texas Senate that, within three minutes of a deranged gunman entering Robb Elementary, there were enough armed officers wearing body armor to "isolate, distract and neutralize the subject" in the classrooms where children lay bleeding, dying and begging a 911 operator for help. Yet no one would go for more than an hour. "The officers had weapons. The children had none," McCraw told senators. "The officers had body armor, the children had none. The officers had training, the subject had none." "One hour, 14 minutes and eight seconds is how long McCraw said the children waited for rescue." During that time, Arredondo, the school district police chief who was recently placed on leave, waited as well, first for a radio he had neglected to bring in, then for rifles that were apparently already there. Then for shields that soon arrived but went unused. Then for SWAT officers, who arrived promptly as well but were made to wait. The, lastly, for a key that was never needed," McCraw said.

The Orangefield Bobcats have been under the leadership of Athletic Director Josh Smalley the last ten years. This upcoming school year will mark the eleventh season for Smalley as their head football coach.

For the second time in five years the Bobcats have been lowered in classification because of enrollment numbers in the Orangefield Independent School District. The next two years at least Orangefield will compete in the Class 3A level for all University Interscholastic League events.

Orangefield will go from being one of the smallest schools in every sport in its

classification to being among the largest student bodies in all sports. "The big deal about being 3A for us is we're just on a more level playing field as far as numbers. We're no longer playing teams with three hundred more kids in high school than us. Being one of the bigger schools is no guarantee of success for the Bobcats. When Orangefield dropped in classification prior to the 2018 football season the Bobcats struggled and did not even make the playoffs that year.

Smalley accepted the blame for that failure because he was complacent, and the Bobcats did have a successful season the next year in 2019 by going to the post season. Smalley evaluated, "It took a rough year in football for me to realize that complacency is the devil, but hopefully we've corrected that."

Motorcyclists rallied on Saturday, June 25, for what they hope will be the first of an annual event to promote awareness for motorcycle safety. The 500 for Life rally began in Orange at the Community Church and concluded at the Cowboy Harley-Davidson dealership in Beaumont.

Cowboy Harley-Davidson cosponsored the event with Columbanus Motor Sports of Orange. Keli Borel of Columbanus Motor Sports said 500 for Life is to emphasize motorcycle safety. "Motorcycle riders are one big happy family, and we're part of that family on the Orange end. We feel very strongly about motorcycle safety. We talk about it to our customers, we talk about it to anybody who visits, and we just want help bring awareness to the fact there are motorcycle riders on the road and everybody needs to look twice and see that rider," Borel explained.

Helping promote 500 for Life was the local chapter of Harley Owners Group or H.O.G. in the

Golden Triangle. Van Jordan the chapter's director, Tony Nunez the assistant chapter director, and other members like J. W. Dalton at Top Deck worked to organize the rally and get as many motorcyclists as possible to take part in this first time event.

Spreading the word to their fellow riders of the event was a major goal for the organizers. "We had to put it on social media, notify everybody, and use word of mouth starting at the Harley shop, through Columbanus, and Dalton's place to get everything and everybody out here together. Thankful that we've got enough people here to show support for motorcycle safety," Nunez commented.

Each participant in 500 for Life registered and signed a waiver with the organizers on Saturday morning. They were given wrist bands to wear and raffle tickets that were used later at the end of the rally at Cowboy Harley-Davidson to award prizes to the lucky recipients.

Henry Gaus bought his first motorcycle in 1979 shortly after he got his first job. Gaus kept an un-

official count of the riders as they registered on Saturday and believed there were at least 250 signed in during registration in Orange. "We're shooting for five hundred this year. At this point in the game we're close to halfway there, so we probably won't make the five hundred this year, but it'll get there in years to come," Gaus responded.

The term family was used by many of those attending 500 for Life to describe the relationship between fellow motorcyclists. Samantha Jordan is the wife of Van Jordan and a new rider of motorcycles. Samantha shared, "It's about family, friends, and everyone coming together as one who all love

motorcycles. I'm just enjoying hanging out with everybody and spending time with my husband and everyone."

Marty Boddie is a pastor at a couple of churches in the Beaumont area and gave a blessing to the group before they departed the Community Church parking lot to head towards Beaumont. Boddie also mentioned the term family in reference to how they feel when one of them is injured. "Our southeast Texas biker community is family, so when one of us gets hurt we all hurt. Unfortunately, we've had way too many motorcyclists killed in the last two or three months so we're trying to bring awareness for motorcycle safety, and of course our heart goes out for families who have lost loved ones to death," Boddie related.

Law enforcement agencies from the Golden Tri-

angle cooperated with the 500 for Life. The Orange County Sheriff's Office had vehicles to help escort the procession of motorcycles leaving the church and riding through the county. Pinehurst, Vidor, and Rose City also provided escorts along the way. The Beaumont Police Department's motorcycle division led the rally as the bikers headed out.

Motorcycle riders came from other communities in Louisiana and Texas to take part in the rally Saturday. Many of the motorcyclists though are members of Cowboy H.O.G. Chapter 4974 based locally.

Chapter 4974 has received special recognition from the Harley-Davidson company located in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to be part of the company's 120th anniversary in July 2023. "Out of the seven hundred clubs in the Unit-

ed States we've been picked to be the number one club to go out there. We're excited, we want to bring the love, but it's going to take a lot to get there so we're going to start now to get ready for next year," Jordan indicated.

As many members of Chapter 4974 as possible will take part in the anniversary celebration for Harley-Davidson. Jordan expressed, "We're going to ride the Harley-Davidsons all the way to Milwaukee and back. And that's the way the four-game series between New York's Pinstripers and the Houston Astros went last week at Yankee Stadium in The Bronx.

The Astros' starting pitching was superlative, completely quieting the mighty bats of the Yankees. Houston's bullpen, which is among the best in the MLB stumbled in two of the four games, while New York's superstar Aaron Judge personally prevented a Houston Astros four-game sweep by driving in the winning runs in both the first and last games of the series.

Ryan Pressly, the Astros superb closer who had saved 14 of 16 games, came into the opener in the bottom of the ninth inning Thursday night to protect Houston's 6-3 lead. The first two batters reached base and Aaron Hicks blasted a three-run homer to suddenly tie the score as thousands of Yankee fans scurried back into the stadium from the parking lot.

Pressly put two more runners on base without retiring anybody and manager Dusty Baker had seen enough and brought in Ryne Stanek, whose earned run average was under 1.00, who got two outs before giving up a game-winning single by Judge to take the first game 7-6. It ruined a quality start for Framber Valdez, preventing him from notching his eighth win against 3 losses.

Friday was an entirely different story as Astros' ace Justin Verlander took the mound at Yankee Stadium and had the Pinstripers eating out of his hand, scattering four hits including a solo homer by Giancarlo Stanton, posting his team-leading ninth victory against three losses and evening the series with Houston's 3-1 win.

On Saturday, the Astros carved out another notch in franchise history with a no-hitter in their 3-0 win as young Cristian Javier threw 115 pitches in his seven innings of mastery over the Yanks, followed by Hector Neris, who walked two in his eighth inning of work and a perfect ninth inning by Pressly, who redeemed himself by notching his 15th save of the season.

This was the 14th no-hitter in Astros' franchise history, with the last one thrown by Verlander on Sept. 1, 2019. The first one was fashioned by Don Nottebart on May 17, 1963.

The last time the Yankees failed to get a hit in nine innings was on June 11, 2003 and the team throwing the six-man no-hitter—Roy Oswalt, Pete Munro, Kirk Saarloos, Brad Lidge, Octavio Dotel and closer Billy Wagner--was none other than the Houston Astros who won the game 8-0.

The Yankees were bound and determined to salvage a split in the four-game series but couldn't muster a hit off Astros' starter Jose Urquidy Sunday until Stanton blasted a solo home run in the bottom of the seventh inning, narrowing Houston's lead to 3-1.

Beginning with the ninth inning of Friday's win, the Astros held the Yankees hitless for 16 consecutive innings, then came Saturday's no-hitter with Urquidy holding them without a hit until Stanton's seventh-inning blast Sunday. No team in MLB history has ever been no-hit in consecutive games, according to Monday's edition of the Houston Chronicle.

Urquidy finished the seventh inning with 100 pitches and Baker was hard-pressed to find fresh, quality relievers. He chose Phil Maton to protect the two-run lead in the eighth inning. Maton struck out two but gave up a single and then a two-run homer to D.J. Mahieu to tie the score 3-3.

Stanek pitched the ninth inning without giving up a run or a hit, sending the game into extra innings. Houston loaded the bases with one out in the top of the 10th innings, but Kyle Tucker and Yuli Gurriel failed to deliver.

Baker turned to rookie J.J. Martinez—who hadn't given up an earned run in his 17-inning young career-- to pitch the bottom of the 10th inning and the Rule 5 pick got two outs but gave up a walk and a single when Judge came to the plate. Baker decided not to intentionally walk him which turned out to be a bad decision by the Astros' skipper.

Judge parked a three-run homer over the left-field wall to win another game for the Yankees, 6-3 and give his team the series split it most desperately needed. Baker said after the game that he didn't want to intentionally walk Judge and then lose the game on a bases-loaded walk by the young reliever.

The Astros began the six games against the two Big Apple teams when they swept the two-game series from the red-hot New York Mets earlier last week at Minute Maid Park before

venturing to Yankee Stadium Thursday.

Houston played the Yankees last night in a make-up game that was canceled during the first week of the season because of the strike.

Congrats to the Ole Miss Rebels for winning the 2022 NCAA College World Series in Omaha Sunday 4-2 over Oklahoma. Mississippi scored three times in the bottom of the eighth inning, with two runs coming on wild pitches. It was a mistake-riddled game as the Sooners had a run taken off the scoreboard on what appeared to be a successful squeeze bunt. But the runner was declared out when he failed to stay within the box up the first base line and the scored runner was ordered back to third. Ole Miss won the first game of the best-of-three championship series 10-3 Saturday.

The big talk around college football fans--especially those favoring the Texas Longhorns--is the verbal agreement young high school quarterback Arch Manning gave to attend the University of Texas when he completes high school next year. Manning is the grandson of Archie Manning and is the nephew of Peyton and Eli Manning. But he can't sign any letter-of-intent until Dec. 11.

Xander Schauffele won the PGA Tour Travelers Championship with a birdie on the 72nd hole after temporary leader Sahith Theegala double-bogeyed the final hole. Schauffele began the final round a stroke ahead and finished with a two-under par 68 at TPC River Highlands in Cromwell, Conn.

The hearing by the NFL on Deshaun Watson's future with the Cleveland Browns began yesterday, with the league wanting to suspend the former Houston Texan quarterback for the entire 2022 season for conduct detrimental to the league's policy. The NFLPA union is trying to get Watson off without a suspension or fine.

Last week's announced retirement of Tampa Bay

tight end Rob Gronkowski will probably last until Buccaneers quarterback Tom Brady says the team needs him. The two have been together during Gronk's entire 11-year career.

A big difference for this season is the Bobcats will be the big fish in the small pond, so to speak, and as a result they will be the ones with a target on their backs. "We haven't had a whole lot of years where we've been the hunted, we've always been the hunters. That's going to be a little different mindset for our kids for sure," Smalley observed.

Continuing with that theory Smalley informed his student athletes during the summer workout on Monday that "Dave Campbell's Texas Football" has picked Orangefield as the favorite in District 10-3A Division I this season. The Bobcats will be trying to win their first district championship since 1988.

Scheduling games for the lower levels like junior varsity and ninth grade teams will be more difficult Smalley admits. Many of the schools Orangefield plays in Class 3A may not have enough kids to field lower level teams, so Smalley will need to recruit games with larger schools in order to have opponents every week for each of the Orangefield teams.

Coach Smalley has surrounded himself with a great group of coaches in his tenure at Orangefield. Todd Trawhon has been with Orangefield the entire ten years since Smalley became athletic director. Trawhon coaches defensive line and doubles as the coach for the boys golf team which sent two Bobcats to the state tournament last year.

The Offensive Coordinator is Chris Pachuca who will be in his fourth year at Orangefield calling the plays for the Bobcats' offense. Head Baseball Coach Tim Erickson joins Pachuca in working with the offensive line.

David Kendrick is the Defensive Coordinator in his second year with the Bobcats. Kendrick also serves as the strength and conditioning coach making the current summer

Filling out the varsity football coaches are Peyton Berg coaching defensive cornerbacks, Troy Sumrall works with inside linebackers, Jake Nash handles outside linebackers, Michael Bethea will coach running backs, and Kolby Morgan coaches offensive ends. The coaching staff will be working with the Bobcat players to try to make the playoffs for the ninth time in eleven seasons.

## Goals For Bobcats

Goals are set every year by coaches and players for every sport each season and this year will be no different. "One area that I've been disappointed in and we've talked to the kids about all the time is we haven't won a district championship here since 1988. Although that's always our goal, we haven't been able to accomplish that goal. We haven't won a lot of playoff games since I've been here and that's been a disappointment and an area I feel like we need to get better at, we've won two in ten years. Obviously, we'd like to improve that," Coach Smalley summarized.

As athletic director Smalley believes he has done a good job in recruiting quality individuals to serve as coaches not just for the football team but for all the teams at Orangefield. Smalley explained, "I feel like we've hired good people. Not just good coaches, but good

people that are quality human beings and quality coaches. That's our number one objective. Yeah, we want to win games and we want to go as far as we can and win district championships, but we've got to put people with character and integrity in front of our kids so they can see what that looks like and people who not only talk it but walk it, and I feel like we've done a good job of bringing those type of people in during the ten years I've been here to help keep Orangefield relevant."

Orangefield has been competitive in all sports both boys and girls during Smalley's ten years as the school district's athletic director. With the lowering in classification the Bobcats should be contenders for several district titles.

Coinciding with football season is volleyball for the girls. The Lady Bobcats are led in volleyball by Ashlee Broussard Peevey who got married over the summer. She is an Orangefield graduate and has coached at her alma mater since graduating from college.

Smalley said Peevey is knowledgeable and energetic while implementing a special exercise program for her student athletes. "We're excited to have her here as our volleyball coach, she does a great job with our kids, and we look forward to good things this year during volleyball season," Smalley responded.

There is a significant change in girls' sports at Orangefield with Eric Girola as the new girls sports coordinator and basketball coach. Girola comes from

the Buna girls basketball where he had around 250 wins many of those in the playoffs.

Girola takes over a successful girls basketball program with the Lady Bobcats. Smalley elaborated, "Eric's got some kids coming back, and he's excited about the girls since he's watched them playing summer basketball."

Heading up the boys basketball program for Orangefield is Jake McDonald. The Bobcats have done a great job making the playoffs during the time McDonald has been there. The last time Orangefield was at the 3A level the Bobcats went several rounds deep in the post season under McDonald's guidance.

Two time district champions the Orangefield Bobcats advanced to the fourth round of the state baseball playoffs the last two seasons. Tim Erickson is the head coach of Bobcat baseball and has helped create a winning tradition with that program at Orangefield. "The best thing that I ever did was hire Tim Erickson and just get out of his way and let him do what he is good at doing," Smalley confessed.

Coming from a family of coaches is Rebekah Ragsdale who heads the Lady Bobcats softball program. The Lady Bobcats were young last season and fought for a playoff spot before falling just short of making the post season. There are a bunch of freshmen, sophomores, a couple of juniors that will be joined by girls moving up from the eighth grade that are going to help them rebound from last season and be successful.

Smalley compared Ragsdale with Erickson. "You

don't question their work ethic, you don't question their knowledge of the game, you don't question their love for the kids because you see it every day and how they live it out being here all the time doing what they need to do," Smalley praised.

In addition to being the defensive coordinator for the football team David Kendrick coaches the Orangefield power lifting team with Chris Pachuca. The Bobcats have had a lot of their athletes go to the state meet including three last year, and they performed well.

As mentioned Todd Trawhon heads the boys golf program. Ashlee Peevey also is the girls golf coach.

Heading up the cross country and track programs is Conner Wilbur. Brittney Stevens oversees the girls in track and field. The tennis program is led by Richard Drouillard.

In the last two decades Orangefield has seen an upgrading of the athletic facilities around the campus. All of them are top quality to serve the student athletes and give the fans a great place to watch the Bobcats perform.

## Artificial Turf?

Artificial turf has been or is being added to every high school football stadium in Orange County except one. F. L. McClain Stadium at Orangefield is the only field where games will be played on real grass this coming football season.

There has been talk especially among Bobcat football fans who want synthetic turf installed at F. L. McClain Stadium.

Coach Smalley indicated administrators in the Orangefield ISD have discussed it. The bottom line though is the cost.

Smalley described the difficulty for answering those requests to add artificial turf at the stadium. "Wanting it and being able to do it the right way are two different things. You've got to put what's best for the community, what's best for the school district above what's best for your football program. Finding ways to pay for it and to be able to afford it without putting people in a financial hole is risky, and it's a tough thing to do and especially in these times with inflation and the prices where they are. It would be kind of selfish to insist on what I want, but there are other things more important right now," Smalley allowed.

With a month before the start of football season Coach Smalley and Bobcats are getting themselves ready with summer workouts. Fifty to sixty high school and another twenty to thirty junior student athletes spend two hours a day in the weight room and once a week they can conduct sport specific drills. Smalley said they are emphasizing work on the passing game to augment the Bobcats' Slot-T Offense running game.

Preseason workouts commence for the Orangefield Bobcats the first week of August followed by scrimmages. The first game of the new high school football season kicks off on Friday, August 26, at F. L. McClain Stadium. The opponent will be the Bobcats' biggest rival the Bridge City Cardinals.

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Spring's now past, a pleasant but hazy memory with summer officially arriving June 21st. So, for the next several months, summer will be keeping us company. This means we can count on a long, hot season for the next several months. Intense sun light and high temperatures have now faded most of our spring flowers, and now is a great time to add color into our gardens for the remainder of the summer here in Southeast Texas. There are numerous flowers which can handle our hot and humid summers, even when rain fall is scarce. There are also many annuals (plants which have only one growing season) and perennials (plants which have two or more growing seasons) that can be grown in our climate.

Petunias – are one of the longest flowering annuals, blooming from spring well into fall and sometimes last throughout our mild winters. To keep them blooming, deadhead them continually by removing spent blooms. Petunias are easily started from seed, but this will take some time before they are ready to provide blooms. If you are like me and don't want to wait, consider purchasing transplants from your favorite garden center, as they will have an assortment of colors. Many local garden centers and nurseries have petunia cultivars (hybrids), such as "Purple Wave" which has a trailing habit and perfect for hanging baskets, in a variety of colors including white, pink, purple, blue and red. For continuous blooms, fertilize them often and ensure adequate moisture is provided without allowing them to dry

out completely between watering.

Zinnias – are easy to grow from seed and provide color throughout the summer. They are extremely reliable bloomers that come in a variety of sizes and colors. From compact miniature plants to tall cutting sizes in colors of pink, red, purple, orange, yellow, lavender, white and green, to name but a few. There are 4 types of Zinnias, and each type depends on the rows of petals in a flower.

- Single Flowered – a single row of petals
- Semi-Doubled Flowered – several rows of petals
- Fully Double Flowered – several petal rows, center not visible, its hidden by the petals
- Cactus Flowered – petal rolls toward the underside, petals twist to form a unique flower

Gaillardia – is a terrific summer-flowering plant which blooms all season. It comes in bright colors of yellow and shades of red and orange, and even deep maroon. They continually bloom without deadheading and are perennial which should be divided every 3-5 years.

Coreopsis – is considered by some gardeners as an old-fashioned flower but it remains as one of my favorites. I grow coreopsis

as an annual from seeds gathered from the previous year and scatter them into new locations. Grown as an annual, it sometimes will come back year after year from self-seeding. The flowers must be deadheaded and colors range mainly from yellow to orange but is now available in red as well.

Yarrow – is a sun-loving perennial with colors of white, yellow and red. Deadheading keeps them from self-seeding and the foliage will remain green during our mild winters.

Coneflower – is a perennial coming in a multitude of colors. Purple is the most common color with hybrids coming in many other colors. All parts of the Purple Coneflower are used for medicinal properties. Coneflowers are great for cut flowers and attract pollinators. They are easy to grow, capable of blooming for months and are heat and drought tolerant.

Marigolds – are an annual many gardeners', including myself, use in our vegetable gardens for companion planting. There are many varieties from the French type to the Af-

rican Amazon variety. They are easily grown from seed and bloom all summer. Marigolds are easy to grow and can take the heat with minimum fuss but need deadheading to continually bloom.

Additional summer flowering plants are Rudbeckia, Monarda (Bee balm), Dahlia, Angelonia, and Gaura. Many can be grown from seed except the Angelonia.
