Adams Bayou bridges to be removed

The Texas Department of Transportation is closing some lanes of the Interstate 10 access road, a move that will make people living north of the interstate in the eastern part of the county happy.

TxDOT is tearing down the low bridges across Adams Bayou on the east and west access roads. Property owners and local government officials have wanted the bridges down because they interfere with the flow of rain water southward to the Sabine River. Adams Bayou drains areas as far north as Mauriceville.

"It's been a long time We've been coming. through four area (TxDOT) engineers on this issue," said Orange County Precinct 1 Commissioner Johnny Trahan.

He predicts it will take the highway department a week to tear down and remove one of the two bridges, and then another week for the same for the other

"I'm thinking it's going to go pretty quickly," he said.

TxDOT began preparing for the lane closures on Tuesday. Traffic on the access roads eastbound and westbound will be diverted to the main Interstate 10 bridge, which is much higher than the access road bridges.

Travelers should get accustomed to the detours. Trahan said they will become permanent as TxDOT added a lane on each direction of the main bridge to accommodate the traffic that will need to enter at one side of the bayou and exit immediately after crossing.

The special lanes are needed because traffic on the access roads would not be able to cross the bayou. As part of the bridge removal project, TxDOT is rebuilding the turn around roads at each direction of the bayou.

Trahan said the short entrances and exits at the

Donna Peterson, an 88-year-old trailblazing businesswoman from Orange, was one of two women honored last week by the Better Business Bureau Education Foundation's first Distinguished Women of Southeast Texas award.

She was presented the award during an expo and conference at Ford Park arena in Beaumont, with speakers including Jefferson County Sheriff Zena Stephens and Elyse Thibodeaux of Bridge City's Tiger Rock Martial Arts, who presented a demonstration on self-defense.

Peterson has owned and operated A-1 Peterson Plumbing for 55 years and became one of the first women in Texas to earn the Master Plumber designa-

She and her late husband, Richard (Dick) Peterson, a U.S. Navy veteran, began the company 55 years ago with one Roto-Rooter machine they carried in the trunk of their car to jobs.

She became known

Plumber" after a local newspaper ran a photograph of her speaking on Career Day to her daughter's school class. She had worn her plumbing uniform and brought a drain-cleaning machine to the school for the demonstration.

Through the years, the business continued to grow and expand to offer all kinds of plumbing and septic job services.. The company for many years has owned a landmark building and space on Border Street in Orange.

After Orange County took a big hit from Hurricane Rita in 2005, the Peterson building was damaged, but she opened up to cook and do laundry for people. Her family, also involved in the business, worked to clear roads of fallen trees and debris so emergency workers could get through.

Peterson herself became a first responder. She helped save the life of a neighbor by giving CPR in

main bridge will allow traffic to get to businesses easily. For instance, westbound interstate traffic will have an exit lane after crossing the bridge to allow them to get to Tejas Drive. State MHMR offices are on the street, along with Free State Winery. Orange Motorsports is also by the exit.

Trahan said locals began lobbying TxDOT officials after Hurricane Harvey in August 2017. The record amount of rainfall flooded most of Orange County with feet of water. People living north of the interstate complained that their flooding was affected by the low access road bridges blocking the drainage.

"On a good day, the bayou is 12 to 14 inches below the bridges," Trahan said.

When it rains, the bridges often flood, causing Tx-DOT to put up traffic bar-

riers to get people to stop. A few years ago, a school bus with young students flooded out on one of the low bridges and rescue crews had to get the students out to high ground.

The interstate was built in the late 1950s and opened about 1960 through Orange County. The access roads did not originally have the low bridges. Eastbound travelers on the access road had to either get onto the main interstate or use a turnaround under the main bridge and then travel eastbound. That system will soon be reinstituted.

Local officials in the 1960s wanted the access roads to go across Adams Bayou, and the low bridges, which are much cheaper and easier to build than elevated bridges, were added in the mid-1970s. It wasn't long, though, before some land developers

north of the interstate, where the city was growing, to begin complaining that the bridges were hindering drainage flow southward down Adams Bayou.

The problem grew until Harvey's flood brought the problem to the forefront. Tommy Clary, who has lived many years on acreage north of the bridges, was one of the citizens leading the movement to remove the bridges.

Commissioner Trahan said when they first made the request to remove the bridges, TxDOT rejected the idea. Locals continued their efforts and became successful. However, some people didn't like the delaware

CIVIL WAR IN GOP-SPEAKER McCARTHY OUSTED

Republican Kevin McCarthy's deal with hardline House conservatives that handed him the speaker's gavel in January unraveled on Tuesday as those same right-wing rebels, shoved him out of the seat. McCarthy's 269-day reign as speaker was ended by a 216-210 vote, a move that has no marker in modern history and paralyzes Congress for the time being. The rebellion, led by conservative hardliner Rep. Matt Gaetz, R-Fla., has roiled the House in chaos. The move to oust McCarthy, known as a motion to vacate, had the support of a handful of Trump hard-right lawmakers who have expressed anger at McCarthy for working with Democrats to avert a government shutdown. Republican Rep. **Patrick McHenry** of North Carolina is temporarily leading the **House** after **McCarthy** was ousted.

It's officially fall! September 22 marked the official start of autumn. Hopefully that means some cooler weather.

Here are five things happening around your state:

1. Port Arthur LNG obtains approval to expand gas plant project

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission approved the permit that authorizes the Port Arthur Liquid Natural Gas plant project to expand into Phase 2, including the addition of two liquification trains capable of producing up to 13 million tons per annum (Mtpa) of liquefied natural gas. That would increase the total capacity of the facility from 13 Mtpa currently to 26 Mtpa. Sempra, the company that owns the plant, expects the expansion will help meet the future domestic demand for liquid natural gas supplies and international demand. The second phase of this project will continue to create new, high-paying jobs in the region and benefit the local economy. Texas is a leader in energy production and I applaud Sempra's decision to expand their footprint in Southeast Texas.

2. Comptroller predicts increase in revenue estimate

At an interview during Texas Tribune's annual conference, TribFest, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hager predicted that the state will have more money available to spend than previously thought. During the 88th Regular Session, legislators passed a balanced budget that totaled \$321.3 billion. Lawmakers also made use of an over \$30 billion surplus from the previous fiscal year. Now the state's accountant says there will be additional revenue, driven mainly by an increase in insurance premiums. Hager did not say exactly how much extra funding will be available, but that number should be released in his October update. How and if the additional money is spent could come up during a potential special session that Governor Abbott has said will begin next month.

3. General Land Office approves \$68M in mitigation projects in East Texas

Earlier this month, the General Land Office (GLO) announced the approval of over \$68 million for six mitigation projects in Deep East Texas, with \$42 million for broadband and interoperable radio communications infrastructure through the Deep East Texas Council of Governments (DETCOG). Other projects are in the cities of Hemphill, Ivanhoe, and Woodville and Sabine County for street improvements and Jasper County for community resource centers, reconstruction of roadways, and



installing elevated water tanks. The DETCOG project will increase connectivity in the region, which is especially essential during a disaster. Businesses, local governments, emergency responders, and other organizations cannot effec-

tively respond to a disaster without broadband access. These projects are critical to Deep East Texas and I'm appreciative of all the work DETCOG and the GLO have done to ensure this funding was made available.

4. Stephen F. Austin State University celebrates 100 year anniversary

This month SFA celebrated its centennial with four days worth of events and parties. The occasion brought thousands of students, alumni, staff, and community members to the campus to commemorate 100 years of SFA. The university opened its doors for the first time on September 19, 1923. It was initially part of the Texas State University System, before becoming an independent university on 1969. This year, the university voted to join the University of Texas System. When SFA opened, there were only 270 students enrolled and classes were held in borrowed buildings in downtown Nacogdoches. Today, SFA has around 11,000 students on a sprawling campus.

5. Broadband infrastructure funding update

In the past several years I have focused on broadband access for rural Texas, and Texas will soon see an influx of new funding toward bridging the digital divide. The National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) announced this summer that Texas will receive roughly \$3.3 billion in federal funding for broadband deployment. These dollars represent Texas' allocation of the \$42.5 billion in funding from the Broadband Equity Access and Deployment Program (BEAD) funded through the Federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021. The Texas Broadband Development Office has submitted a plan to the NTIA for the use of these federal dollars and will by the end of the year submit additional required planning documents to the NTIA. The bulk of the \$3.3 billion could then be made available as early as the end of next year or the beginning of 2025. Meanwhile, Texas Voters will have the chance in November to vote on Proposition 8, which creates a new Broadband Infrastructure Fund to expand high-speed broadband access. If approved by the voters, Proposition 8 will provide an additional \$1.5 billion of funding allocated by the Texas Legislature to increase broadband access and closing the digital divide.


Lettie Jean Blanda, 89, of Orange, Texas, passed away on September 27, surrounded by loving family at home.

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


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Orangefield Bobcats rally past Panthers


Orangefield won the coin toss prior to the game and deferred to the second half. The Panthers got the

In the secondary Bryce Dubose is a leader. Dubose has a pick six to his credit this year with the Pirates who lead the district in




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Historic victory for Smalley, Orangefield Bobcats

For The Record

Last week was an exciting and historic win at Orangefield. This Friday night the Bobcats take their undefeated district re-

cord on the road against another team without a loss in district.

Orangefield played Anahuac which was the preseason favorite to win the district, and the Panthers were 4-0 on their season and 1-0 in district before the two teams met last week. The Panthers jumped out to a 13-0 lead, but the Bobcats came back and won by two scores 32-20 to go 2-0 in district action.

Coach Josh Smalley was honored after the game with a plaque signifying his sixty-eighth career victory mak-

ing him the winningest football coach in the history of Orangefield High School. "While I am proud and honored to have reached this milestone, this is not about me but a team. Success cannot happen without the support of those around you. This is truly a 'team' accomplishment. Milestones are not reached without the support of the school administration, school board, staff, and the community," Smalley replied.

Smalley thanked all his coaches and the players during his 11-year tenure at Orangefield for their outstanding efforts and work. The coach also thanked his

wife Kim for all the support she has given him through the years.

Smalley acknowledged any success that he has achieved is a direct result of the Good Lord above and His Son, Jesus Christ. Smalley added, "I thank Him daily for letting me do what I love for a living. I am nothing without Him and give Him all the honor and glory."

The first two district games have been victories for Orangefield but were not achieved the same way. "We started so fast against Buna two weeks ago, but it kind of went the opposite way as the Panthers punched us in the mouth the whole first quarter. We got behind 13-0, and I credit our kids and coaches we didn't quit or throw in the towel and kind of found a way to work

our way back into the game a little bit. tackle, plus tight ends Kalvin Calhoun, We got down again in the third quarter and then found a way to work our way back. It shows a little bit about the character and the integrity plus the work ethic of our kids that even when things aren't going real great they're still not going to give up or quit. They're still going to fight, scratch, and claw to find our way back into a game," Smalley emphasized.

The Bobcats' motto for this season is 'Keep Swinging the Axe' and that was evident in the game against Anahuac. Smalley explained, "It's like cutting down a tree. That tree may not fall on your first swing, or your second swing, or your third swing. It may take a thousand swings to get that tree to fall. We told the players at halftime that it wasn't the first quarter or the second quarter, it may take four quarters for that tree to fall. If you look back at the game it was three and a half quarters the tree started to sway and fall down."

Bobcats that were helping make that tree eventually come tumbling down are in the offensive line. The Orangefield O-line is composed of center Brayden McGee, strong guard Kim Tsan, strong tackle Ethan Brown, Blake McRight at quick guard, Ethan Blackburn at quick Akilles Garcia, and Jacob Worthy.

"The offensive line all the way through tackle to tackle plus two tight ends has done a really good job of not getting their heads done or getting discouraged with some early struggles. Now hopefully it has paid off and will continue to pay off," Smalley analyzed.

In recent years the football program at Tarkington has not had the best of records. That has changed this season as the Longhorns are 4-1 on the season and scored a dramatic touchdown on the final play of the game to win at Hardin in Tarkington's first district game.

The Longhorns operate an old school offense the Flex Bone out of the Pistol formation. The quarterback is in the shotgun and the fullback is behind him with two slot backs and two wide receivers. Tarkington will run the ball about 85 to 90 percent of the plays on offense.

On defense the Longhorns do not give up a whole lot of yards. In the games played Tarkington has averaged giving up about 205 yards to opponents and is very good at stopping the run.

Orangefield and Tarkington play Friday. The game will kick off at 7:30 PM in Tarkington.

For the second straight


