County has four contested local races

Filing ended Monday for candidates running in the Texas party primary races in March with only Republicans running for local county elections. Four of the 13 races will be contested, with the sheriff's race drawing the most candidates.

Sheriff Jimmy Lane Mooney will be seeking his second four-year term in the position that he won in 2020 after the retirement of Keith Merritt. His challengers include veteran law enforcement officers Ron Dischler, Mike Sanchez, and retired Texas Ranger Bobby Smith.

All qualified voters in Orange County may vote for the sheriff's position. The other countywide contested race will be for the chair of the Orange County Republican Party. Cheryl Warren is challenging incumbent chair Leo LaBauve III for the spot.

All four county precinct constables will be up for re-election. Incumbent Jeremiah Gunter in Precinct 2 has two opponents, both retired after law enforcement careers. They are David Bailey, who is currently serving on the Orange City Council, and Harold Hass.

In Precinct 4, incumbent Matt Ortego will be facing

James Scales gets jolly job

When Larry David passed away in 2020, he left some big boots to fill, along with a red velvet suit and a beard. James Scales made the fit.

The Bridge City native and descendant of two Orange County pioneering families, has now become Santa Claus for Heritage House Museum and the annual Orange Christmas Parade.

He will be appearing at Heritage House's Candle Light Tours Thursday from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. The museum's main house is a restored 1902 two-story house built by J.O. Sims and furnished as an upper-middle-class home.

Heritage House began the tradition of an annual visit with Santa when it first opened in 1978. Larry David, one of the museum's founders, volunteered to be Santa and continued the role for more than 40 years.

Scales after the loss of David, members of the Her-

Orangefield parade, festival Saturday

The historic oil community of Orangefield will once again celebrate the Christmas season with a parade and festival Saturday, December 16, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Chris Kovatch with the Orangefield Fine Arts Boosters said the group has

a contingency plan to hold the festival inside the junior high gym in case of rain.

The parade will begin at 10 a.m. at the Orangefield Oil Supply Company on FM 408 and go a short ways to FM 105. Then the parade will turn west and turn north onto Sandbar to end at the junior high.

The festival will be set up at the stadium with booths

selling crafts, Christmas items, and food. A car show will be set up on the new parking area at the elementary school.

The high school band and drill team will perform on the field. Also, the Cormier Museum full of historic and nostalgia items will be open.

Kovatch said the community Christmas celebration

was started several years ago by another group. It was stopped during the Covid pandemic and didn't start up again. Last year, the Fine Arts Boosters began it anew.

The Fine Arts Boosters represents the Orangefield band, color guard, drill team, and choir. Kovatch

The field for the Texas Republican primary election is set – here’s what to watch for

The field is set for the Texas primary — making way for a dramatic few months ahead of the March election.

At the top of the ticket, Texans will vote on who they want as their party’s presidential nominee — where Donald Trump has a landslide lead for Republicans and President Joe Biden has no serious competition among Democrats.

That means the most interesting action in Texas will be down-ballot.

With both Gov. Greg Abbott and Attorney General Ken Paxton out for revenge, Republican members of the Texas House are the top target on the ballot. But Democrats are also facing ample drama as political dominoes fall in Dallas and Houston, creating new opportunities for ambitious members of the party.

The candidate filing deadline for the March primary was 6 p.m. Monday.

On the GOP side, much of the primary drama is being driven by Abbott and Paxton.

Paxton is working to unseat the dozens of House Republicans who voted to impeach him in May, while Abbott wants to defeat a smaller group of House Republicans who thwarted his yearlong push for school vouchers. That has created a rare dynamic where two of the most powerful Republicans in the state are backing primary challengers to House Republicans, sometimes aligning behind the same challenger and sometimes not.



The aggressive involvement of Abbott and Paxton means Speaker Dade Phelan will have his hands full defending his GOP members. And Phelan has a primary of his own after running uncontested in 2022. This time he faces two challengers, led by David Covey, the former chair of the Orange County GOP.

It has led to a marked increase in primary challengers. After 43% of House Republicans faced opposition in 2022, at least 57% have primary challengers this time.

The Texas GOP said Tuesday it had “a record-breaking 387 candidates file in Austin, plus many more in their local county offices, marking the second-highest candidate turnout in the history of the” party.

The attorney general has endorsed nearly two dozen primary challengers to state House Republicans who voted to impeach him. Those candidates, like Paxton, have positioned themselves as further right than House leadership and could prove to be antagonistic toward Speaker Dade Phelan — should he win his own primary. The Texas Senate acquitted Paxton after a trial in September.

Paxton’s endorsees include Republicans like

who stood in his way.

Making good on that threat, Abbott has gotten behind challengers like Hillary Hickland, an activist mother from Belton who has taken her kids out of public schools in recent years. She is running against Rep. Hugh Shine, R-Temple.

Other notable primary challengers have emerged in recent days. Shelley Luther, the Dallas salon owner who became famous to conservatives for defying COVID-19 shutdown orders, filed for a rematch against Rep. Reggie Smith, R-Sherman. And Katrina Pierson, the North Texas activist best known as a spokesperson for Trump’s 2016 campaign, joined the primary against Rep. Justin Holland, R-Rockwall.

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Abbott and Paxton are also playing in open seats

where they believe they can replace retiring House Republicans with a better political ally. One example is House District 14, where anti-voucher Rep. John Raney, R-College Station, is not seeking reelection and Abbott has endorsed Bryan businessman Paul Dyson for the seat. Abbott said in his endorsement that he trusts Dyson to “expand school choice for all Texas families once and for all.”

In House District 87, Abbott and Paxton have aligned behind Caroline Fairly, the daughter of an Amarillo businessman, Alex Fairly, who Texas conservatives are working to cultivate as a new megadonor. Fairly is among four Republicans running to replace retiring Rep. Four Price, R-Amarillo, who opposes school vouchers.

In the Texas Senate, Republicans are looking at only one competitive primary, to replace retiring Sen. Drew Springer, R-Muenster. Four Republicans have filed for that seat, though one of them, Denton County GOP Chairman

Brent Hagenbuch, is the frontrunner after getting endorsed by Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, the very powerful presiding officer of the Senate.

As for congressional primaries, the GOP focus is largely on two open seats — the 12th District, where U.S. Rep. Kay Granger, R-Fort Worth, is retiring, and the 26th District, where U.S. Rep. Michael Burgess, R-Lewisville, is not seeking reelection. Each primary has drawn a crush of candidates, though state Rep. Craig Goldman, R-Fort Worth, has piled up almost all the notable endorsements for Granger’s seat and conservative media executive Brandon Gill recently got the backing of former President Donald Trump for Burgess’ seat.

The closest thing to a competitive primary involving a congressional incumbent is probably in the 23rd Congressional District. U.S. Rep. Tony Gonzales, R-San Antonio, is facing four primary challengers after splitting with his party on issues like guns and the border.

Scales, bought him his own costume with beard, wig, and hat. "She wanted to make sure I look good," he said.

One of his first regulars was his niece, Stella Scales, who is now accompanied by her little sister, Indie. Scales said Stella, now 6, looked at him closely and curiously the first couple years. Last year, she figured out Santa was portrayed by her uncle.

Scales said he's not sure Indie knows, yet, but he suspects Stella has blabbed to her little sister.

said money raised at the festival will go toward scholarships for graduating seniors in those arts. Last year, the group presented five graduates with \$1,000 scholarships.

Kovatch, who is also a member of the Orangefield ISD school board, said the district will soon be able to "light the derrick" for special occasions and wins. The inspiration came from a tradition nearly half a century ago.

Orangefield began as "The Orange Oil Field" after an oil gusher was drilled in 1921. The area became a boom town with its own schools and has remained as a community for more than a century.

For many years, the community was dotted with old-fashioned metal derricks and pumping wells. By the 1980s, they had become a backdrop for even national television shows to film. At Christmas time, the derrick by the Cow Bayou Bridge was covered in lights with a star at the top.

Hurricane Rita knocked down almost all the old-fashioned derricks that had been left. Kovatch said his group discussed decorating the old

one again for the holidays, but the effort was going to take too much.

The community built a wooden replica old-fashioned derrick by the school complex. Kovatch said Bridge City Bank agreed to sponsor the purchase of a LED light system for the derrick.

The system can be controlled remotely through a

smart phone. It will be able to provide a number of different lights and combinations. For instance at Christmas, it could be lit up with red and green. For special wins and accomplishments at the school, it can be lit in the school color of orange.

Joey Jacobs, currently a captain in the Orange County Sheriff's Office. Precinct 1 incumbent constable Lannie Claybar, and Precinct 3 incumbent, Brad Frye, are running unopposed.

For the precinct races, only registered voters within each precinct vote for their respective constable race.

Newcomer Octavia Guzman drew no challengers for the Orange County Tax Assessor-Collector job. Incumbent Karen Fisher is retiring at the end of her term. Guzman is a longtime employee in the office.

Another newcomer will be Krispen Walker, who drew no challengers for the Orange County Attorney's position, which also serves as the district attorney. Incumbent John Kimbrough is also retiring. Walker has been an assistant district attorney for a number of years and gained

a reputation as a tough prosecutor.

Rodney Townsend, a longtime lawyer from Bridge City, is running unopposed for judge of County Court-at-Law. Incumbent Troy Johnson is another official who will retire at the end of his current term.

Also running unopposed as incumbents are State Judge Courtney Arkeen of the 128th District and State Judge Rex Peveto of the 163rd District.

In the Orange County Commissioners Court races, only the Precinct 1 and Precinct 3 seats are open this year. Incumbents Johnny Trahan in Precinct 1 and Kirk Roccaforte in Precinct 3 filed and will be unopposed.

Primary races in Texas will be March 5 with the last day to register to vote as February 5. Early voting will begin February 20 and end March 1.

THE GREATNESS OF MANDELA

Ten years ago I watched all the Nelson Mandela service including President Barack Obama's speech. Ninety-one governments were represented. Former United States Presidents Jimmy Carter, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and their spouses attended. President Obama drew the largest reception. He shook hands on the way to the podium with Raul Castro. Mandela was one of a kind; born in 1918, he died at age 95. After being imprisoned 27 years, where he was mistreated and often kept in solitary confinement, he came out at age 70 and transformed South Africa in a successful struggle against an apartheid system of racial segregation. It earned him the Nobel Peace prize. He told President Clinton once, "That in prison they took away everything, but they couldn't take his heart or mind." He taught that hope always trumped fear. Millions of words have been written about this great man. There were those who had negative words, mostly because he was a man of color and they wanted to discredit him. Mandela died Dec. 5, 2013 at the age of 95. He was just one of the great people who lived during my lifetime but his life stands out.

REMEMBERING LOIS JUDICE

Lois Bourgeois Judice, age 95, passed away on December 1. Funeral services were held December 5, at St. Henry Catholic Church in Bridge City. I was not aware of her passing until after her service was held. In my early years I had been really close to Edwin and Agnes Bourgeois and the family. Back in the late 1940's and early 50's, I would sometime arrive in Port Arthur during the night after hitchhiking all day from Louisiana. I would tap on Ms. Agnes's window and she would let me in. Tired and hungry, she would get me something to eat and get me a pillow. The boys, Ray, Kenneth, Gene and the baby Richard were the ones I knew best. They had two sisters, Lois and Cecile. I don't recall the exact year, maybe 1949, Lois, the prettiest girl in Port Arthur, was named Miss Port Arthur in a beauty pageant. She dated A.J. Judice, who always drove a fancy convertible. They married and had five children, Larry, Debbie, Al, III, Kevin and Karen. A.J. and I had been very close and did a lot of things together and attended many events in the Motherland. We once appeared together in a front page photo in *U.S.A. Today* racing crawfish on A.J.'s famous race track. I recall when Harry Waddell's brother Tommy, gave Kenneth a guitar that his little brother Gene learned to play and grew up to be "Jivin Gene," a lifelong friend. Ms. Agnes had a brother who was one of my best friend's dad, and the Bourgeois boys spent vacation time in Abbeville so I met them at a young age. Gene and I still stay in touch, not as often as we should. I'm saddened by Lois' death. She was an angel among us who raised a great family. She lived in the shadow of A.J., the Cajun promoter, but always stood out to those who knew and loved her. Lois had a good, long life and now is reunited with her loved ones. May she rest in peace. Jerk Baits For Winter Fishing

Cooler water and air temperatures along with overcast days conjure up a recipe for the coastal pluggers and big fish are the main course on the angling menu. These conditions dictate a different approach and a different mentality from the rest of the year. Some things are obvious, slowing down and paying attention to water temps and tides go without saying. The more subtle approach and bait presentation are also high on the list. At this time of the year many folks revert to slow sinking plugs in order to entice sluggish fish to bite. The slow sinking plugs like Corkies, Catch 5, and others take a little time and patience to master. Another option that is a little more user friendly is the jerk bait. Many saltwater anglers rarely use these highly effective plugs, but the ones who do often swear by them.

I really became a firm believer in how good these plugs work on late winter trip to Calcasieu. "Man can you believe this water, this is beautiful," said Capt. Johnny Cormier of Orange. Indeed it was beautiful, 3 feet deep with a mix of heavy oyster and sand that was inhabited by plenty of redfish and lunker trout or two. As we idled along studying the bottom we began to see fish darting away from the boat, most were redfish. "Let's get out and wade this" said Cormier grabbing for his gear, "hold on a minute, let's see if we get one of these out here to bite" was my reply. As Johnny found his wading belt a stout redfish found my offering, a classic Rapala jerk bait. Needless to say we never got out of the boat as the redfish continued to chew us up. Occasionally we would move a hundred yards or so until we found the fish but the pattern was the same as were the results.

On that particular trip Johnny and I both tried different options for catching those redfish, a few other lures worked but they always had some kind of drawback. A Corky stayed hung in the shell just like the soft plastics on a jig head. The top water offerings were refused and you just couldn't cast lighter baits in the wind. The solution was a shallow diving Rapala called a BX Minnow which is a medium sized diving twitch bait that floats when not being pulled. Once pulled or retrieved this model Rapala dives to about 2 or 3 feet maximum and rattles like all get out. It also will back up when you run it into structure like shell, this little pause as it floats back near the surface usually triggers violent strikes. This plug is very castable even in the wind and that rates high on the "user friendly" scale.

Other plugs that fall into this category would be the Storm Thunderstick, Smithwick Rattlin Rogue, and Yo-Zuri Crystal Minnow. A simple retrieve is all that is needed and the plug will do the rest, the results will speak for themselves. On those days when you just can't get a fish to come up and eat top water this is the next best thing. Also the fact that most of these plugs float saves you some grief as well when you break off against unseen obstructions like shell. These plugs will usually float to the surface where they can be reclaimed and put to use again. Rig these lures up with a loop knot and you can double the action or wobble that is built in to these shallow running plugs. The seductive side to side movement is difficult for even finicky fish to resist. The jerk bait is an often overlooked weapon in the saltwater fishing arsenal but during the winter this plug really shines. Give one of these lures a chance and you will be amazed at how easy they are to fish and just how productive they can be under the right circumstances.

Gulf Coast Fishing Reports

This week's Texas Gulf Coast Fishing Reports was compiled by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department

• **Sabine Lake**

GOOD. 74 degrees. Shrimp migration has the bait fish rolling out of the marshes and birds are working leading the way to fish. Limits of trout and limits of redfish are good drifting points and bayous in Sabine Lake off the bottom in the morning with 3/4 ounce silver and gold spoons, or 3/4 ounce gold chartreuse 5 inch plastics. Early morning North Levee bite for speckled trout on topwaters, and 5 inch plastics, then live shrimp under a popping cork. There is some bird action that can land speckled trout casting under the birds. Lots of speckled trout on the North end of the lake, but mostly undersized, with redfish mixed in. Nice redfish and a few trout are good in the Neches River shell banks, points, turnarounds, rock piles and buoys using 1/4 ounce jigs with glo chartreuse plastics. Every cut has bait holding scattered catches of trout and redfish. Report by Captain Randy Foreman, Captain Randy's Guide Service Sabine Lake.

• **Bolivar**

GOOD. 60-65 degrees. Scattered catches of speckled trout on incoming tides at the jetties. Most anglers are fishing the late afternoon evening for speckled trout, redfish, black drum, few sheepshead and crabs off the rocks at the jetties. Reports of a vermilion snapper and lang snapper caught off the beach. Catches of small tarpon in the bays, jetties and surf. Big stingrays in the surf. Report by Shane Rilat, North Jetty Bait Camp. Fish deeper ends of the reefs or wind protected cuts with wind and cooler temperatures. The jetty holding sheepshead and trout on live shrimp close to rocks. Yates Slough's holding redfish on grass lines close to Siever's Cut. Stingaree's to Rollover holding redfish in deeper marshes on popping cork with shrimp and artificial twitch bait, or split tails. Report by Captain Ray-

mond Wheatley, Tail Spotter Guide Service.

• **Trinity Bay**

GOOD. 62 degrees. Burnett, Scott, and Tabbs Bays are good for speckled trout, the occasional redfish, black drum and sheepshead. A few oversized black drum and redfish coming from the same area. Live shrimp is working best, followed by soft plastics. Northern end of Trinity bay producing fair catches of speckled trout. Schools of bull redfish are in open water. Report by Captain David Dillman, Galveston Bay Charter Fishing. Trout are showing up heavily in the morning and can be caught in live shrimp under a popping cork and soft plastics. Redfish are on protected shorelines with grass and rocks and can be caught under a popping cork or weed less gulp. Sheepshead are around structures with barnacles and can be caught using a popping cork with shrimp. Drum are plentiful with the same pattern as sheepshead. Report by Captain Zackary Scott, Zack Attack Fishing.

• **East Galveston Bay**

FAIR. 59-62 degrees. Shoreline waders catching decent numbers of speck-

led trout. A few redfish roaming the bayous and drains. Report by Captain David Dillman, Galveston Bay Charter. Surface water temperature 59 degrees, water clarity is good. Points and mud flats with scattered shell have produced good catches of trout and redfish on our artificial lure trips in the 2-4 feet of water. When we find nervous bait the fish are close by, so move on if you do not see bait activity. A few birds are still working in the bay, but not as prominent as weeks passed. Fish are biting shrimp imitation lures with Fish Smack popping corks, with 14-18 inch leaders as well as Deadly Dudley Terror Tails in Blue Moon Chartreuse on 1/8 and 1/16 ounce jig heads, depending upon wind conditions and water depth, as the fish are preferring the slower fall of the lighter heads. Live shrimp has produced consistently, and provided plenty of fish fighting action for anglers fished under a popping cork and 20-24 inch leaders. The bite should continue to be great as the water cools and the days are getting shorter. Report by Captain Jeff Brandon, Get the Net Guide Services, LLC. North shore of Smith Pointe holding redfish and trout under the birds. Gas wells in East Bay holding

black drums on the bottom with shrimp. Deep Reef to Whitehead Reef is holding fish under birds on twitch baits and soft plastic split tail in beetle green clear or just clear. Report by Captain Raymond Wheatley, Tail Spotter Guide Service.

• **Galveston Bay**

FAIR. 61 degrees. Scattered catches of trout and redfish from the west shoreline from Eagle Point north coming off of shell and old pier pilings. Good catches of oversized redfish in the gas wells adjacent to Redfish Island. Best bite on live shrimp, but soft plastics have been effective. Report by Captain David Dillman, Galveston Bay Charter Fishing. The railway bridge by causeway holding some drum and oversized redfish biting shrimp, crab, or mullet. Bull redfish are in the channel on both jetties. The surf side is holding sheepshead and trout using shrimp under popping cork or free lined near the rocks. Redfish are in the harbor at both ends of Pelican Island Bridge. Report by Captain Raymond Wheatley, Tail Spotter Guide Service.

• **West Galveston Bay**

FAIR. 62 degrees. Chocolate Bayou and Bay continues to be the hotspot for speckled trout and redfish, along the shell reefs lining the bayous edges. Anglers drifting in streak water finding fair numbers of speckled trout and redfish. Best bite on soft plastic followed by live shrimp. Waders found some good fish wading the south coves and along the north shoreline of the bay. Report by Captain David Dillman, Galveston Bay Charter Fishing. While the winds are out of the north, look for sloughs off of the ICW holding fish in calmer water. The sloughs leading to Greens Lake, Carancahua Lake and Chocolate Bay holding redfish and trout watch the tides in shallows. Wader are landing trout and redfish South of Cold Pass in deeper waters. Jones Bay holding a few fish early on soft plastic. Report by Captain Raymond Wheatley, Tail Spotter Guide Service.

• **Toledo Bend Fishing Report**

FAIR. Water clear; 62-66 degrees; 4.23 feet below pool. Fishing patterns are holdin steady. Bass are good and should only improve as the water cools. Bass are in three stages with catches up to 8 pounds. Shallow bass are in 2-6 feet of water biting spinnerbaits, chatterbaits and rattletraps. Bass in 10-18 feet of water can be caught using a big crankbait, Texas or Carolina rig worm. Deeper bass can be found in 22-28 feet of water on spoons, dropshots and any kind of deep diving bait. Texas fans going nuts for tickets to CFP game

On January 1, Texas will square off against Washington in the Allstate Sugar Bowl with a chance to compete for the national championship on the line. It's a matchup that's sure to garner a significant amount of attention and there's little doubt Longhorn fans will be anxious to pack the seats in New Orleans.

There's just one problem, however.

With limited capacity at the Caesars Superdome, only 68,400 tickets have been made available for the game. And for Texas, they will have access to just 13,000 of them.

That's a significant problem for the Longhorns, who have had nearly 52,000 ticket requests — 31,694 from season-ticket holders and donors, and another 20,000 from students.

Texas attempted to quell the disappointment in an e-mail earlier this week, reminding families, donors and fans that they've been shorted tickets in the past. They cited the 2006 Rose Bowl, 2009 Fiesta Bowl and 2009 BSC National Cham-

pionship Game as examples.

Ultimately, Texas encouraged those seeking tickets to check the secondary market.

"Though we will be unable to fulfill your request through the Texas allotment, tickets may be available for purchase through the official Allstate Sugar Bowl ticket seller," the

e-mail read. "You may also visit SeatGeek, the official fan-to-fan marketplace of the Texas Longhorns."

The school promises additional available tickets (20,000) for the BCS Na-

tional Championship Game should they defeat Washington and move on. In the mean time, there are going to be some hurt feelings and deserving people left out.

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Tangible Acts of Christmas

I've been ruminating on a text of Scripture that has me rethinking how I've typically sought to share the gospel with others at Christmastime.

For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person — though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die — but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:6–8)

This is the phrase that has stuck in my mind: "God shows his love for us." And the word in that phrase that has particularly gripped me is shows. God shows his love for us.

When it comes to love, it's a matter of show and tell (and often in that order). We know love when we both see it and hear it. Words are an essential dimension of how we show our love, but it's our actions that prove the truth of our words. Love, like wisdom, "is justified by her deeds" (Matthew 11:19). Love, like faith, "if it does not have works, is dead" (James 2:17).

And that's what has me rethinking my approach to Christmas evangelism. I wonder if I have sought to love others with too much talk and not enough deeds.



By This We Know Love:

You might recognize in my words the echo of another passage:

By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers. But if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him? Little children, let us not love in word or talk but in deed and in truth. (1 John 3:16–18)

There it is again. We know God's love for us by the way Jesus generously showed love toward us. And the way Jesus showed his love for us provides a profound model for how we as Christians are to show our love for one another.

We know from Jesus's holistic example, however, that we're not merely to show love to other Christians. For we are to "do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith" (Galatians 6:10). And Jesus tells us that even our loving deeds toward other Christians speak to unbelievers: "By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" — love they can see (John 13:35).

Haunted by Christmas Past

Now, the reason I'm pondering all this in the context of Christmas is because it's an annual moment when our culture's collective attention is drawn in some way toward Jesus. In the increasingly post-Christian West,

people have the general notion that at the heart of Christmas is love. They have this notion because it's an echo of the ancient story that still reverberates through Western civilization:

When the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons. (Galatians 4:4–5)

Even though many misunderstand or ignore or reject this echo, it often still leaves them with a sense that Christmas is about redeeming love.

We can hear strains of the echo in many of our culture's favorite Christmas-themed stories, from A Christmas Carol to How the Grinch Stole Christmas, where deeply selfish souls experience some kind of redemption after

an encounter with transcendent love — often, like Scrooge, merciful love. They are shown love. And as a result of this encounter, they are transformed into loving souls who discover a far greater joy than they've ever known in counting others more significant than themselves. These stories are haunted by the ghost of that ancient Christmas past, when "God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son" (John 3:16).

Show the Love

Putting this all together, it's hitting me in a fresh way that Christmas is a particularly poignant time to show the love of Christ to those outside the household of faith.

So, what might that mean exactly? Well, at the time I'm writing this, which is just after Halloween, I'm not sure exactly. Because rather than planning a program, I'm planning to keep my eyes open and as the Lord's leads, to follow the needs. Christian love, as John Piper says, "is the overflow of joy in God that gladly meets the needs of others" (Desiring God, 119). Often, we can't foresee what people will need, but we

can plan to reserve some time and money so that if needs arise, there are practical channels through which our love can flow to meet them. And experience has taught me that, if I'm paying attention, rarely is there a lack of needs to meet.

Over the years, I have participated in, coordinated, and led countless Christmas events — worship services, musicals, parties, neighborhood and family gatherings — intentionally designed to present the message of the gospel to nonbelievers. And I don't regret having told them about the love of God in Christ. It is a way to show them God's love. But I do feel some regret that I haven't given more time and energy to showing more people the love of God in Christ through tangible, personal deeds. And so I'm seeking to change that — to demonstrate the truth of my words with actions of love by intentionally and prayerfully looking for ways to show the love "in deed and in truth" this year.
