LSCO to transform historic church for future

Lamar State College Orange and the Stark Foundation are assuring local residents preserve the past while preparing for the fu-

On Tuesday, under a clear crystal blue sky, the local college had a groundbreaking ceremony outside the old First Baptist Church building on Green Avenue in downtown Orange. "We want to preserve this beautiful building, said LSCO President Dr. Tom Johnson.

PDG Architects of Houston has designed a modern style interior to serve as the new Student Success Center. G&G Enterprises, a second-generation Orange-based company, is the contractor. Natasha Garrett, CEO of the company, talked about being part of a community and saving history.

Johnson said the college is drawing many students who are the first generation of their families to attend college. The new center will be a place to welcome them and help them

with advancing their education. He said he was the first from his family to go to college.

"They're a little nervous. I know I was," he said about people coming to get information. He pointed out that the new LSCO Academic Building under construction is across the street from the church.

The Stark Foundation had bought and rescued the moldy building after the congregation of First Baptist Church abandoned it and moved outside the city when Hurricane Ike flooded it in September 2008.

Iohnson thanked Stark Foundation President and CEO Tad McKee, along with Walter Riedel, retired president and CEO, for the donation and their support to the college. He said the foundation gives many scholarships each year to LSCO.

He also thanked State District 21 Representative Dade Phelan, for helping to get the Texas Legislature to appropriate \$6 million for the new center.

Thieves take antique doors from Evergreen **Mausoleums**

Thieves at historic Evergreen Cemetery in Orange have stolen glass and bronze doors off three mausoleums of people related to the 19th Century timber baron Henry Jacob Lutcher, who died in 1912.

Some of the people interred in the Lutcher mausoleum include three people instrumental to the early development of the University of Texas with their names still prominent on the Austin campus.

According to the Texas Historical Marker at the cemetery, the first burial there is believed to have been in 1840. The cemetery is on Border Street a couple of blocks south of the Orange County Court-

A descendant of the family, Corey Stark of Or-

ange, said he fears the thieves may melt down the doors for the metal. He discovered the missing Lutcher mausoleum doors on Friday and reported them missing to Orange

He talked with Dr. Frank Brown, a retired college professor and descendant of the family, and learned the Brown mausoleum doors were also missing, along with those of the Slade family. One of the Browns married a Slade. Those doors may have been missing for two weeks.

Stark said the Lutcher mausoleum doors were taken sometime last week and he estimated they may weigh 600 to 800 pounds. He said he knows someone with a business on Border Street and will re-

Sheriff candidates face off as early voting nears

Three challengers to incumbent Sheriff Jimmy Lane Mooney said they want to improve relationships between the Orange County Sheriff's Office other agencies. Mooney said he stands on his work of the past three years, which includes negotiating a new contract with deputies and getting

them pay raises. The four appeared in a question and answer forum last week that was sponsored by the Orange County Republican Party. All four are running in the March 4 party primary with no Democrats running to challenge the winner in the November

on Tuesday, February 20. Mooney is seeking his second four-year term after winning to replace retiring sheriff Keith Mer-

ritt. Ron Dischler, a lieutenant with the Beaumont Police Department and longtime resident of Orange County, is a challenger, along with Vidor ISD Police Chief Mike Sanchez, and former Texas Ranger Major Bobby Smith, who said he retired to run for Orange County Sheriff. All four have years of law enforcement experience.

Sanchez was not able to attend the forum because he was diagnosed with Covid. His wife appeared

for him with his answers. All candidates were given the questions ahead of time. The questions had been submitted to the party online days earlier. The chair of the Hardin County Republican Party was the moderator.

One question involved the county's former HIT unit, or Homicide Investigation Team. Different police and county agencies assigned officers to respond immediately to anywhere in the county that had a murder.

Mooney said he did not "shut down" the HIT unit. He said "it was gone before I got there." He said District Attorney John Kimbrough told him the unit had quit functioning.

Dischler, Sanchez, and Smith all said they would bring back the HIT unit. Dischler pointed out the he had worked as a homicide sergeant for Beaumont police and it's good to have assigned people to do the work needed for the investigation immediately. Sanchez said manpower is needed on such investigations and he would get back the unit. Smith said he had worked with HIT representing the Texas Rangers and he supports the unit.

One question was how would each candidate, as sheriff, handle a call someone from the FBI, ATF, or other federal

7,500 people interred there. The cemetery is fenced, but gates are left open and in recent years, some of the drives have been paved.

The theft of the mausoleum doors are all that appear to be disturbed at this time. Urns with ashes in some of the mausoleums have been taken into the cemetery's offices for safe keeping until the doors can be replaced.

Sergeant Henry with the Orange Police Department said Monday afternoon the thefts were reported on Friday afternoon and were assigned to detectives on

Monday. At this time, the investigation is in the beginning phases. If anyone sees anything that resembles such antique doors, they should contact the Orange Police Department at 409-883-1026.

Henry Jacob Lutcher, his wife, Frances Ann Lutcher, and their two daughters moved to Orange from Pennsylvania in 1876 for the Lutcher and Moore Lumber Company. The company once owned vast amounts of acreage in Texas and Louisiana, plus operated a number of sawmills.

Daughter Miriam Lutcher married William Stark, and daughter Carrie Lutcher married Dr. Edgar Brown

William Stark served as a

regent for the University of Texas and sent his and only surviving child, H.J. Lutcher Stark, to the university. Lutcher Stark had the first automobile on campus and served as manager of the school's football team. He is given credit for naming the university team as Long-

Lutcher Stark and his father later served on the UT board of regents at the same time, and Lutcher was named chair of the committee to build Memorial Stadium in the 1920s. He served as chairman of the board of regents for a number of years and oversaw the growth of the campus.

He married Nita Hill, the daughter of prominent Austin physician Dr. Homer

Hill, who served as the football team's doctor from 1893 until his death in 1923. Moore-Hill Hall at the university is named in the physician's honor. Hill and his wife, along with Nita, are interred in the Lutcher mausoleum.

The Stark Library in the UT Tower serves as the president's office and the H.J. Lutcher Stark Center for Physical Culture and Sports is next to Memorial Royal Stadium on the cam-



"I will not assist a federal or state agency that is going to come in and violate a citizen's Second Amendment right," Dischler said. He described himself as a "constitutional sheriff."

The constitutional sheriff theory is growing with the idea that a county sheriff is the highest law within the county and can supersede the federal government's authority.

Sanchez's reply was "I support the Second Amendment and I will stand by our law-abiding citizens.'

Smith said as a citizen of Texas and the United States, he believes in the Second Amendment and the Fourth Amendment, which requires a "reasonable search." He said if a citizen calls about someone "seizing his weapons without probable cause," he would protect the rights of the citizen.

"I'm a strict Second Amendment supporter and there will be nobody coming into our county to take our guns," Mooney sa

Early voting will begin Tuesday, February 20, because the 19th is the Presidents Day holiday. Sites in Orange County are the Orange Public Library in downtown Orange, Mauriceville Community Center on Cohenour Road, Orange County Airport on Highway 87 South, and the Raymond Gould Community Center on Claiborne Street in Vidor.

Any registered Orange County voter with proper ID will may go to any one of the sites.

The hours will be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesday, February 20, through Friday, February 23; 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday, February 24; 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Sunday, February 25; and 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday, February 26, through Friday, March 1.

Other contested local races include District 21 State Representative with David Covey of Mauriceville and Alicia Davis of Jasper County are running against incumbent Dade Phelan, who currently also serves as speaker of the house.

TRUMP ENCOURAGES RUSSIA TO ATTACK NATO ALLIES

Donald Trump's claim that he once told a NATO ally that he would encourage Russia "to do whatever the hell they want" to "delinquent" members of the group sent shockwaves through Europe over the weekend. As he moved closer to winning the Republican presidential nomination a third straight time, Trump's tightening grip on the GOP is reshaping the party's traditional defense of longstanding military alliances and rejection of Moscow, positions that date back to the days of the Soviet Union. Trump has a long history of denigrating NATO, and former administration officials say he repeatedly threatened to withdraw the U.S. from the alliance that has been central to U.S. policy for decades. Former U.N. Ambassador Nikki Haley, now Trump's last major rival for the Republican nomination, told reporters Monday she was "appalled" by Trump's comment and questioned why he was siding against "our allies who were with us after 9/11." President Biden said Trump's remarks were un-American and dangerous. Trump "talked many times about getting out of NATO behind closed doors and publicly. So that's just a fact." John Bolton, Trump's former national security adviser and now a strident critic, said he believed Trump would almost certainly try to withdraw from NATO if he wins a second term. Trump is often criticized for praising Russian President Vladimir Putin and suggesting cuts to aid to Ukraine as it fights Russia's offensive. **Trump's** comments came at a rally in Conway, South Carolina, where he told a familiar story aimed at demonstrating his negotiating prowess. "I said, 'You didn't pay? You're delinquent?'" Trump recounted telling the person. "He said: 'Yes. Let's say that happened.' "No I would not protect you," Trump said, adding: "In fact, I would encourage them to do whatever the hell they want." It remains unclear whether the conversation Trump recounted Saturday actually took place. The former president has a long history of fabrications and exaggerations. Aides declined to answer questions about the conversation.

Simple approach yeilds best results

I have no idea why we as anglers are constantly trying to complicate things, always re-inventing the wheel and adding corners. In our never ending quest to catch more and bigger fish we often stray down the path which we think leads to discovery only to find that out that if we had just read the street signs we'd be in much better shape.

Over the years it seems like we have become so

Fishing reports have become "thesis like" statements so full details that instead of helping they now hinder the angler. A once simple task has now become so complex that many anglers doubt their own ability to catch fish. An extremely simple answer to this new

"information overload phenomenon" can be summed up with 4 letters, "K.I.S.S.", and they stand for Keep It Simple Stupid. I am a firm believer in the concept and you should be as well.

In our quest to become "fish catching machines" and "super anglers" many of the best things about the sport of fishing routinely take a backseat to the "newest, latest, and greatest". I usually get my own brand of wake up call from clients who share the boat with me, especially kids and anglers new to

the sport.

Sometimes it takes seeing the sport through a different set of eyes to help you truly focus on what's good. If you stop for just a moment and think about what is the most basic and pure moment in the whole fishing equation it has to be when a fish pulls on the other end of the line. At that moment it doesn't matter what lure or bait your using, what rod your casting, or even what kind of fish is doing the pulling. All that is good about the sport is compressed into that split second when excitement and anticipation meet, that's what keeps us

coming back.

Now a lot of fisherman will scoff at the notion of simplifying the fishing process and they are certainly welcome to do that because the sport means different things to different people. I personally

love to simplify things every now and again because it helps me gain perspective. Here recently I have taken to the notion of getting "uncomplicated" and it's been a blast.

For years when I first started guiding my security blanket if you will was a handful of Mansfield Maulers and a bag of glo cocahoe minnows. I spent hours drifting that slender rattling cork made by the legendary Bob Fuston and I caught the heck out of fish while doing so. I have come full circle and returned to my old ways it seems as I now reach for that rod with a cork on it more often. I don't care who you are or where you fall out on the angling scale everyone who fishes loves to see a cork dance and then plunge under water, it's the most basic of all scenes in the sport and something that every fisherman has in common with one another.

The idea of fishing with a cork will certainly be met with resistance from those who believe themselves above such mundane types of fishing and that's okay because everyone has certain likes and dislikes

I have no problem slowing things down every now and again, taking a little time to just have some fun and get a bite. It's even better when those bites become big fish and it's great when they won't hit any of the "high tech" lures of those who look down upon the cork. Nothing like hearing a guy at the dock who is decked out in the latest high end clothes, glasses, boat, and truck tell his buddies "yeah they caught fish but they were using corks" while he puts an ice pack on his pride.

Redfish, sheepshead and drum catches on bayous shell humps with Carolina rigged live shrimp. Limits of slot redfish can be had off the rock piles and shell flats in the ICW. The influx of freshwater has pushed most of the fish south, slowing the trout bite. As the winds lay, expect the trout bite at the levees to resume.

Some catches of stingrays and sharks reported in the surf, along with a few bull redfish. Nice catches of speckled trout, black drum, sheepshead, redfish and flounder reported in East Galveston Bay. White, brown, ghost and hopper shrimp have all been present in the bay, indicating a good shrimp migration. Report by North Jetty Bait Camp.

Trinity Bay

SLOW. 58 degrees. Few reports while the bay is freshwater. Best chances will be to fish along the northwest and western shoreline around Dow's Reef. Bays along the upper ship channel should begin to clear on each incoming tide. Report by Captain David Dillman, Galveston Bay Charter Fishing.

Water continues to be stained after the recent floods but there is good water to be found in the backwaters. Redfish are being caught on swimbaits with a weedless hook. Trout can be caught south where the water salinity is higher with shad soft plastic in the chartreuse color under a popping cork. Drum and sheepshead are being caught around boat docks and structure free lining live shrimp.




